E. Dennis Speaks On "Imagination and Business" At Kiwanis Luncheon.

"Imagination in Business," was the subject of the address given by E. R. Dennis at the Kiwanis Club luncheon

The speaker declared nothing great had ever been accomplished without it first having been imagined, and that imagination, or inner sight, being backed up by action.

Everybody was in possession of the power of seeing pictures of what might be, but most people had not the confidence to support it with their will and judgment and make it a reality.

It is usually thought that a child

who has a very vivid imagination would make a much better professional man than a businessmen, but such is not the case, if the will and judgment are properly combined with the imagina-

Every person who gives anything new to the world must first see a pic-ture of the thing in his own mind, before it can be developed and turned into use for mankind.

It would be impossible to have an inventor without any imagination.

The speaker mentioned several things in use throughout the world today that were a direct result of some person using their imagination. He continued: "Imaon is the thing that places ideals before the minds of people, they get an ideal and the mind draws a vivid picof it and they carry that view ambition to be exactly like the picture in their minds."
