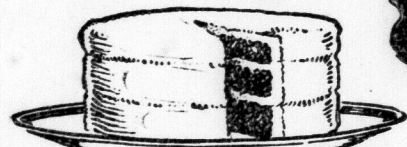

LUXURY PRISON IS FAILURE, TEN MURDERERS ESCAPE

Chicago, July 20.—The policy of pampering dangerous criminals by permitting them to enjoy the almost unrestricted freedom of "honor farms" and providing model living quarters isn't proving an unmitigated success at the Illinois state penitentiary.

The prisoners, it now develops, are taking advantage of their privileges with a frequency that causes Chicago police to doubt the wisdom of the policy of pampering.

Over the week-end, Otto Malm, a Chicago murderer, sentenced for life, killed another prisoner. During the same time a Chicago robber walked away from the prison quarry, where he was supposed to have been hard at work.

These happenings, coming on top of the report of Chief of Detectives William Shoemaker that ten murderers from Chicago have escaped from the penitentiary honor farm within less than a year, have caused prison officials to give considerable thought to the wisdom of their system of giving special privileges to dangerous criminals.

SHANGHAI KILLING WILL BE PROBED

Incident of May 30 Will Be Fully Investigated by Inquiry Board.

Shanghai, July 20.—The report from London of the powers' consent to hold a judicial inquiry into the May 30 Shanghai shooting incident has met with the greatest approbation here on the part of the municipal council, foreign consulates and Chinese and foreign business interests. All agree this will be the quickest and most satisfactory way to settle the long deadlock.

The inquiry board is expected to consist of an American, British and Chinese, without a Japanese.

The chief stumbling block centres on admission of Chinese to the municipal council. The Chinese demand nine representatives, but the foreigners are reported to be prepared to grant only two.

THIEVES GET \$400 FROM DEPOT SAFE

Grand River Railway Station at Preston Entered Early in Morning.

Galt, Ont., July 20.—Early today, robbers forced an entrance into the Grand River Railway depot at Preston, and secured a sum reported at \$400 from the safe. The robbers manipulated the combination. Detectives of the Canadian Pacific Railway are now making a thorough investigation.

Two weeks ago robbers forced open the safe in the railway's local depot, and got away with \$357.

BOOM IN CATTLE TRADE BRINGS NEW BOAT LINE

Canada's Increasing Business With Britain Necessitates Additional Steamers.

The Leyland Line of the International Mercantile Marine will have three sailings from this port during the next month, and it is understood that this service will be continued if the shipments prove a success.

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YOU BET HE'S WINNING OUT!

Bryan Gives His Testimony In Defence of John Scopes; Crowd Endangers Floor

Attorney Makes Plain His Entire Confidence in Integrity of Scriptures.

Dayton, Tenn., July 20.—The trial of John Thomas Scopes, for violation of the anti-evolution law of the state of Tennessee proceeded today, but the man who taught evolution to the high school boys of Dayton was not much in evidence.

William Jennings Bryan, one of the prosecuting attorneys, was a witness for the defence.

After he had been cited for contempt, Clarence Darrow, defence lawyer, apologized to Judge Raulston for one of his statements of a few days ago, and the judge accepted his apology. The judge paid tribute to Tennessee, and the illustrious men the state had produced, and then said, "The savages died on the cross pleading with God for the men who crucified him. I believe in that Christ. I believe in those principles. I accept Colonel Darrow's apology. The great crowd of spectators at today's court endangered the floor of the courthouse, so that Judge Raulston took advantage of the fine weather to hold the best part of the sitting in the yard."

Bryan's Testimony.

Affidavits of scientists precluded from testifying by a ruling of Judge Raulston were read into the records of the court this morning, but the feature of the day was the testimony of Bryan, former secretary of state.

"Do you believe that everything in the Bible is true?" asked Darrow.

Bryan entered into a lengthy explanation, the substance of which was that he had full confidence in the integrity of the Scriptures.

"Do you believe that Jonah was swallowed by a whale?" asked Darrow.

"I would believe it if the Bible had said it," responded the witness to this trick question.

Bryan believed that the Bible should be interpreted "as it is there," not necessarily literally, "because some of it is figurative language."

Darrow questioned the witness as to his belief in regard to the Biblical account of Joshua's making the sun stand still.

"Don't you know that to do that would have been necessary to lengthen the day?" asked Darrow.

"I do not know about that," replied Mr. Bryan. "But I do know that with the strength of my puny hand I can stay the law of gravitation and prevent this glass of water from falling to the ground. Certainly I would not hesitate to believe that Almighty God could stop the sun or the earth in their courses."

A ripple of applause followed each of the witness' statements.

The attorney-general objected to Mr. Darrow's "cross-examination" of his own witness. "He's a hostile witness," the Chicago man retorted.

"You can't cross-examine your witness, Colonel Darrow," the court interjected, "but I am going to let Mr. Bryan direct the extent of his questioning himself."

Bryan rose from the witness chair. "I want Judge Darrow to have all the latitude he wishes in examining me," he said, "for I am going to have some latitude myself in examining him."

Amid applause, Bryan faced Judge Raulston, and told him that the defence attorneys had not come to Dayton to try "a lawsuit," but to direct an attack against revealed religion, and "I am here to defend it."

Again and again the fundamentalist leader asserted he accepted certain Biblical phrases "because the Bible said so."

"Don't you know that there are any number of civilizations that have been traced back 5,000 years?" asked Darrow.

"I am not certain that they are right."

"Do you mean that you do not believe that there was any civilization on this earth 5,000 years ago?"

"I am not in the Bible in preference to the opinions of those who made the estimates."

Rush For Gold At Port Arthur

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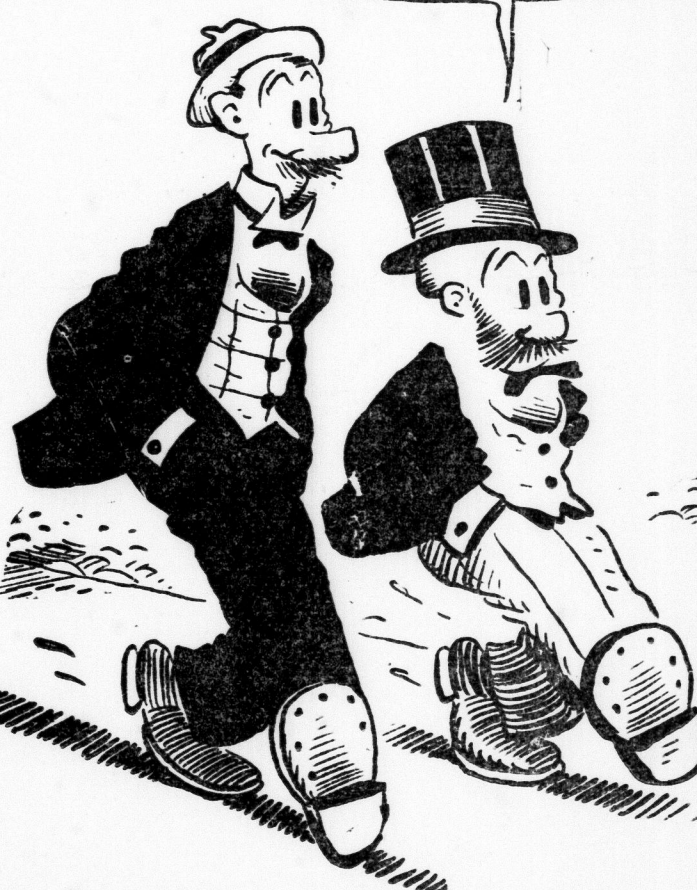

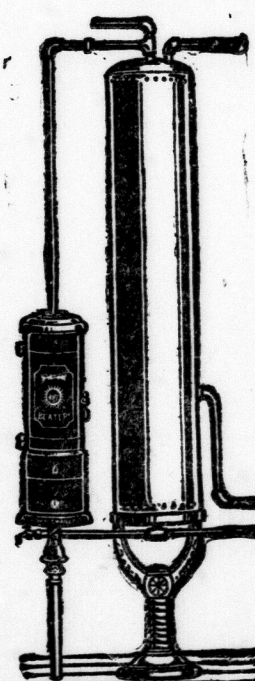
