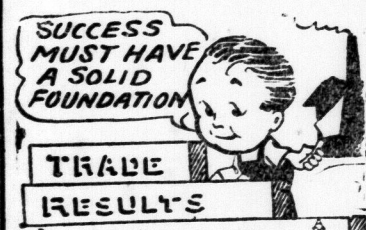

CARNIVAL CLOSES CLINTON REUNION

Final Day of Big Celebration
Brings Record Crowd of
Over 8,000.

Clinton, Aug. 5.—Today, the last day of Clinton old boys' and girls' reunion, brought a record attendance of some 7,000 people who flocked in from all over the county to enjoy to the fullest extent the closing day of the greatest celebration ever staged in this town. For many blocks autos lined the streets, and the huge crowd made traffic a real problem. Thousands of flags and dozens of yards of bunting form beautiful decorations on the streets, homes and public buildings.

Although surrounding points have been visited by showers, not a drop of rain has fallen here during the entire four days of the reunion. Neither has there been a single hitch in the program, or an accident to mar the merrymaking. Last night's fun did not let up until after 4 o'clock in the morning, and rarely if ever has there been a more orderly assemblage of this nature.

Small games featured this afternoon's program. In the first, a hard-fought game, Mitchell defeated Godech with a score of 5-4. The second game was between Mitchell and Wingham, the former coming to the lead with a 13-5 score.

Athletic games and sports of all kinds were held in the town park and, keenly competed, formed one of the finest programs of its kind ever witnessed in this district. The Galt Kelly Band supplied excellent music.

This evening the crowd was increased by over 8,000, and as the minutes hurried last the spirit of merriment grew until the entire town fairly glowed in happiness. The Alce Dunbar company of London, Highland dancers and musicians, headed the parade on the town square tonight. Their numbers were immensely enjoyed. Mrs. Humphries of Florida, a former Clinton girl, gave a number of very fine vocal solos, which were much appreciated by the many who knew how to show their esteem for real talent. Clinton kites hand also took a high place in the production of music. A street dance and carnival are now going on, and are likely to continue far into the early morning.

LIGHTNING KILLS PARKHILL FARMER

Angus MacIntosh, 28, Sought
Shelter Under Tree During Storm.

Parkhill, August 5.—Angus MacIntosh, 28 years old, son of J. D. MacIntosh, of this town, was instantly killed when he was struck by lightning about 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Mr. MacIntosh, with his father, was cutting oats on their farm two miles east of Parkhill. When the storm came up they took refuge under a large tree in the field. The elder MacIntosh was badly shocked by the same bolt which killed his son, and lay on the ground unconscious for almost half an hour. When he came to, he immediately called for help. William Fraser, a farmer living a short distance away, heard the cries and rushed to the assistance of Mr. MacIntosh. Dr. C. Wilson, of Parkhill, was called and rendered medical aid. The body of the dead man was removed to his home.

Mr. MacIntosh is survived by his parents, one brother and four sisters. Funeral arrangements have not as yet been completed.

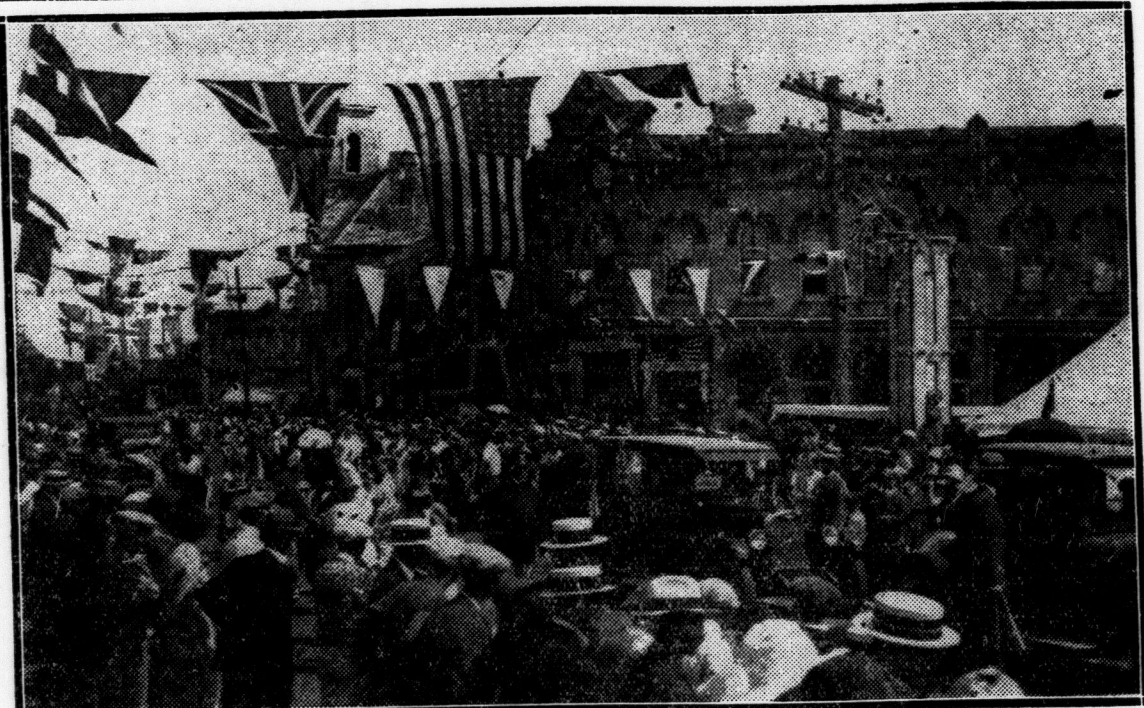

HURRICANE SWEEPS ALPS TRAILED BY DEATH AND RUIN

Mountain Climbers Hurlled Into
Abyss, While Villages
Also Suffer.

Turin, Aug. 5.—A hurricane raged through the Alps today, tearing up houses and trees and endangering the lives of dwellers among the peaks.

From Monte Rosa came word that two Alpine climbers had been swept away by the swirling force of the storm. One of them was blown down into an abyss while the other for a fleeting moment clung in safety to a rope above the gaunt chasm. Then stronger blasts swept him, too, down into the depths.

Another tale of tragedy came in from Ivre, relating the fate which had befallen Monte Barone, 7,500 feet above the sea level. There the villagers were celebrating the feast of the Redeemer when the hurricane roared in from the mountains, knocking down houses and tearing up trees. In its path, the wind seized a woman, dashing her as though she were no more than a blade of straw, down into the abyss below. From Bolzano on the border of the Tyrol came the words that customs warehouses had burned with enormous damage.

FARMER TO ANSWER CHARGE OF ASSAULT

Edward Zealand Summoned
For Alleged Brutality To
Home Boy.

Port Hope, Aug. 5.—Provincial Constable Tom Cousins visited Port Hope today and laid a charge of assault occasioning actual bodily harm to Nicholas Thompson, Barnardo boy, against Everett Zealand, who is being summoned to appear before Magistrate W. A. F. Campbell here on Monday morning. The Barnardo home authorities are taking an active interest in the case, and Supt. Aldgate telephoned Constable Cousins from Toronto, asking him to take prompt measures.

GUN FIGHT IN STREET CREATES SENSATION

Two Policemen Injured in
Capture of Check Forger.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 5.—A downtown lunch-hour throng was thrown into confusion, and two policemen, a deputy city marshal, and an unidentified check forger were wounded in a running revolver fight here today. The forger, who had just attempted to cash a bogus check at the Mississippi Valley Trust Company was captured.

The pursuit, which was taken up by policemen at each corner, and in which many shots were fired, caused great excitement in the downtown section.

Thamesville Bird
Ottawa's Choice
White Leghorn Sent To Kansas
Baby Chick Show.

Put Embargo On American Cattle

St. Thomas, Aug. 5.—Prevalence of the foot and mouth disease in a number of states led to an embargo against cattle from United States, effective this morning, according to local railway officials. The federal department of agriculture is determined to prevent the spread of the disease into Canada, and accordingly shipments routed through here are being re-routed.

2 CHILDREN DROWN IN LAKE ST. CLAIR

Mother in Serious Condition
As Result of Attempted
Rescue.

Detroit, Aug. 5.—A boy, 7, and a girl, 5, are dead today, and their mother is in a serious condition after her attempt to rescue the children from the deep waters of Lake St. Clair yesterday afternoon.

The mother is Mrs. Harold Williamson, of 3759 Route Place. The boy, Howard, stepped into a deep hole while bathing, and his screams attracted the mother's attention. She plunged into the water, but the boy drowned before she could reach him.

The girl, Edna, followed her mother into the water and was drowned. The bodies were recovered by an older brother, Ernest, 11. The tragedy occurred near Luika camp, where the Williamson family were passing two weeks.

ANNUAL GARDEN PARTY ATTRACTS BIG CROWD

Over Two Thousand Hear
Speeches at Cargill
Event.

Cargill, Aug. 5.—The annual garden party of the Centre Bruce United Church of Canada, which was held last night at the home of A. E. Mewhinney, M.P.P., of West Bruce, attracted a crowd estimated at over two thousand. The gate receipts amounted to \$501.00. This is Bruce county's grand annual summer event, which has never yet failed to draw the largest crowd of any outdoor entertainment of the season. Favored with exceptionally fine weather, this year's event set a new record for attendance. Rev. Mr. Atkinson, pastor of Centre Bruce United church was chairman of the evening.

There was excellent programme of speeches, readings, solos, recitations and instrumental music. James Malcolm, M.P., for North Bruce, spoke on Canada and the British Empire. Rev. M. R. D. Sinclair, of Tiverton, president of the Bruce county educational association, dealt with educational matters.

J. J. Hunter, editor of the Kinardine Review Reporter, spoke on general conditions of the province of Ontario.

DELEGATES NAMED BY LABOR COUNCIL

R. Foxcroft and G. Brewer To
Go To Ottawa Con-
vention.

R. Foxcroft and G. B. Brewer were chosen to represent the London trades and labor council at the dominion trades congress, which opens its 125th session in Ottawa on Monday, August 31, at a meeting of that body in the Labor Temple last night.

That the local council will have a number of important resolutions to forward to the congress through its representatives was indicated by Delegate Albert Graves, who himself had drafted nine resolutions for the approbation of the council. It was decided to call a meeting of the executive for Friday night to deal with all formal proposals.

Among Mr. Graves' resolutions were that the congress officially disapprove of the school cadet movement, and demand that industrial plants be denied the right to maintain armed police, and that the sending of armed forces to strike zones be unlawful.

MAY REOPEN WAR ON SHIP COMBINE

Preston Acquires More Reasons
For Lowering of
Freight Rates.

Montreal, Aug. 5.—Renewal of the controversy over the ocean freight rates to United Kingdom and continental ports is forecast, following the arrival in Montreal, on Saturday next, of W. T. R. Preston, author of the report to Ottawa, alleging a combine in ocean rates.

It is reported that Mr. Preston has acquired in England further information with which to launch another campaign for lower ocean freight rates.

HOAX IS SUSPECTED IN CALIFORNIA FIRE

Insurance of \$100,000 Is Carried by Pretended Victim.

Martinez, Cal., Aug. 5.—An unidentified workman from New York City was tentatively accepted by authorities today as the murder victim whose charred body was found in the laboratory of the Pacific Cellulose Company last week after an explosion and fire, as a result of which Charles Henry Schwartz, Berkeley chemist, is being sought on a warrant charging murder.

Evidence gathered yesterday revealed that Schwartz, who at the time of the explosion was believed to have met his death, had advised a helper about the plant, and had told employees that he was expecting a man from New York.

Working upon this theory, the authorities hoped to solve the mysterious case, which is believed to be an insurance hoax plot.

Schwartz carried insurance policies in excess of \$100,000.

BANK OFFICIAL TO FACE EMBEZZLEMENT CHARGES
