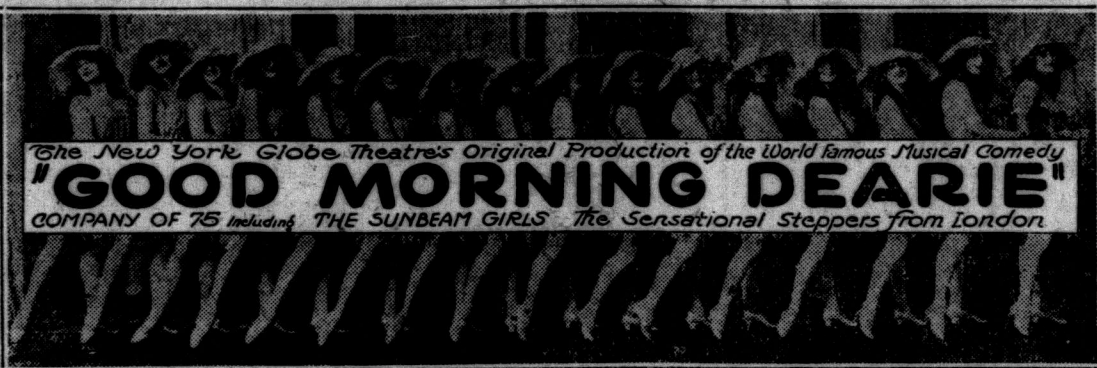

PRINCE STOPS ON TRIP TO PAY SCHOOL VISIT

Children So Delightful That
He Asks Teacher For
Holiday.

Montreal, Oct. 12.—One of those
delightful incidents which explain the
charm and the naturalness of Lord
Renfrew occurred today when the
royal visitor was riding back after the
run of the Montreal Hunt. His Royal
Highness' attention was directed to
a little roadside schoolhouse at
Hermas, a community in the County
of Two Mountains. His lordship
thought a visit would be a pleasant
interlude in the routine of school

work, so the party stopped, dis-
mounted and paid a call.
The permission of the teacher was
asked to enter the school, and this
being at once accorded, the caller—
his incognito for once discarded—was
introduced to the children in his real
character as the heir of the British
throne. There was a little speech
from the prince, and he capped his
popularity by saying the children
were so delightful that he would ask
their teacher for a holiday.

drawn brewery truck collided with

WOMAN IS SLAIN; SUSPECT ESCAPES

Son of Montreal Minister Be-
lieved To Have Com-
mitted Crime.

GIRL FINDS BODY

New York, Oct. 12.—Police tonight
broadcasted the description of a man,
believed to be the son of a Mont-
real minister, whose 97th street room
adjoined that of Miss Estelle Phil-
lips, attractive department store
executive, until this morning, when
her mutilated and almost nude body
was found on the floor near her bed.

While a futile search for the sus-
pect was being made, police as-
sembled from bits of evidence in the
room and on the body, a connected
story of the murder. They believe
the assault was committed by a de-
generate who entered the room while
Miss Phillips was asleep and strangled
her before she could call for help.
A handbag containing four cents
found open at her feet, investigators
think, was left by the murderer to
give the appearance of robbery as the
motive for the crime. A towel was
knotted about the dead woman's
throat, and there were evidences of
a desperate struggle.

Boarded Train.

Detectives said a man closely
answering the description of the
suspect was seen boarding a train
for Montreal at the Grand Central
station at 8:45 o'clock this morning.
The man had identified himself to a
fellow employee in an up-to-date
hospital as the son of a Montreal clergy-
man, the police learned. He took
the room in the 97th street house a
week ago. Miss Phillips had lived
there six years.

Miss Katherine Meltria, friend of
the murdered woman, and an occu-
pant of the 97th street house, gave
the best description of the suspect
after she had found Miss Phillips
dead when she entered the room to
arouse her this morning. She said
she was awakened shortly after mid-
night by "smothered, gurgling sounds"
from the direction of Miss Phillips'
room. Alarmed, she arose and lighted
the gas.

Heard Steps.
She said she heard steps in the hall
half an hour later. Opening the
door, she peered out and saw the man
starting downstairs. His room sepa-
rated hers from Miss Phillips'. The
man wore a cap and carried a suit-
case and an army overcoat on his
arm, she said.

Curious at the hour of his de-
parture, Miss Meltria said she went
to the window, and watched him
board a surface car. The man who
boarded the Montreal train, besides
answering the same personal descrip-
tion, wore the same sort of clothes
and cap, and carried a suitcase and
an army coat similar to that seen by
Miss Meltria.

QUEBEC ORGANIZES 'DRY' FEDERATION

Will Seek To Suppress Liquor
Traffic Throughout the
Province.

SEVEN RESOLUTIONS

Montreal, Oct. 12.—The Quebec Pro-
hibition Federation or the Quebec
branch of the Prohibition Federation
of Canada, was formed here today
at the provincial convention of tem-
perance forces. Only three dissent-
ing votes were cast against the pro-
posal. The purpose of the new or-
ganization, as stated in the constitu-
tion, is "The total suppression of
the liquor traffic through the closest
possible co-operation and unity of
action of all temperance forces of
the province; the promotion of a sys-
tematic and vigorous policy of edu-
cation among the youth and ele-
vation of the province and the se-
curing of the most vigilant and ef-
fective enforcement of the existing
temperance law."

Seven resolutions were passed at
the closing sessions of the conven-
tion. These included requests that
only one bottle of liquor should be
sold to a purchaser in any one day
according to the letter as well as the
spirit of the liquor law.

That the liquor stores be required
by the commission to carefully guard
against sales to persons under 18,
to any convicted of drunkenness, and
to any person who habitually drinks
to excess.

The convention strongly disap-
proved of professors and teachers taking
a stand publicly in favor of drink
habits and customs, urged the gov-
ernment to co-operate with the Uni-
ted States in preventing rum running,
took a strong stand against the es-
tablishment of any college town or
place where there was a returned
soldiers' hospital of any liquor stores;
asked that the government amend
the law to stop shipping of liquor
into dry areas, and objected to the
practice of hotel keepers of delivering
beer to the rooms of the hotel or of
serving wine there.

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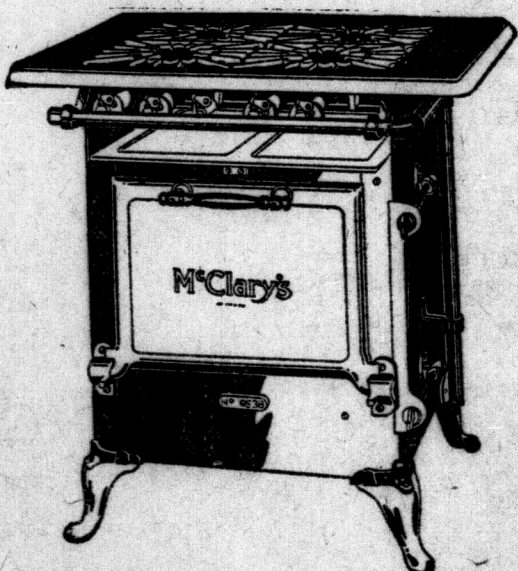
