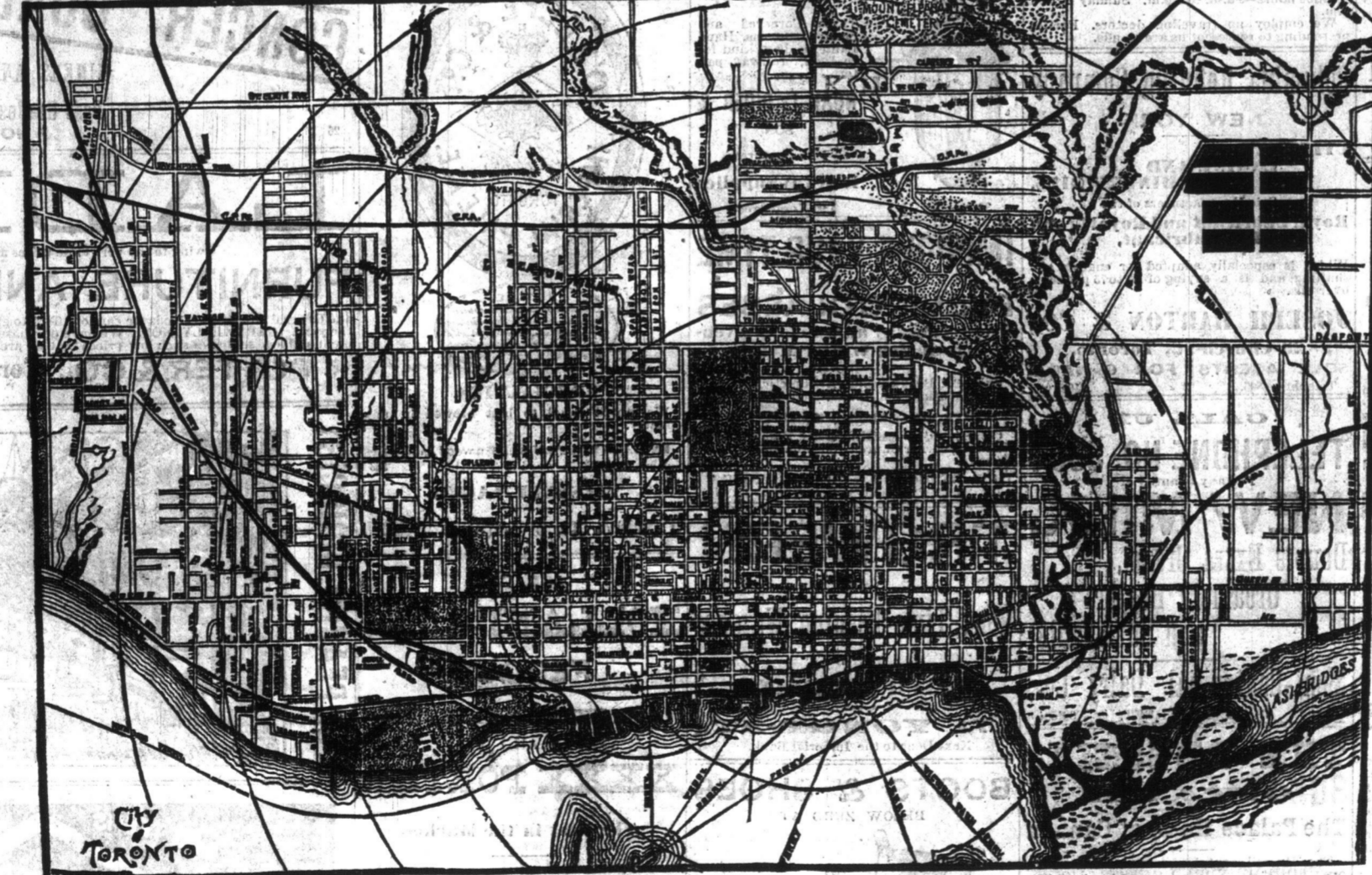

NINTH YEAR. THE FISHERIES TREATY

SOERING DEFERRE TO BRITISH INTERESTS

Mr. Charles Tupper Interviewed. Fish, Free Lumber, Free Salt and Coal said to be conceded—All other points published in the Standard.

As yet no authentic information is given to the press as to the content of the treaty so far as the fisheries are concerned. The understanding among the commission is that the contents of the treaty will be divulged in the regular and proper manner.

There is, however, no reason to believe that Canada has not come out of the deal with all that she can get.

Mr. Charles Tupper Interviewed. Mr. Tupper arrived from Washington and registered at the Windsor. He is in splendid health and spirits. He was your correspondent this morning and answered our questions regarding the fisheries treaty.
