

ANOTHER MURDER CASE.

SMITH AND BROOME ON TRIAL FOR THE DEATH OF MARY ATKINS.

The latter appears to have been but little, if at all, implicated in the murder—Kramer, the German, formally acquitted and Dickie re-arrested on an arson charge.

At the Criminal Assize Court yesterday morning, before Mr. Justice Rose, Frank Smith and William Broome were put upon their trial for the murder of Mary Atkins. Smith is a man of about 35 years of age and his companion appears to be somewhat younger. It is charged by the Crown that early in the morning of May 22 last the prisoners met Mrs. Atkins, an old woman, on Chestnut-street and, representing to her that they were policemen, took her in charge. Instead of taking her to a police station, they brought her to Queen's Park, where they, or one of them, at least, assaulted her, inflicting such injuries that she died in the jail from the effects a few days afterwards.

Mrs. Atkins was a woman who gave her age as 57, but who looked to be much older. She was married by the assistant matron as a modest woman of retiring disposition. Mr. Barton has charge of the case for the Crown; Mr. T. C. Robinson is defending Broome and Mr. E. E. Swaine is looking after the interests of Smith.

E. C. Umbach and Patrol Sergeant Robinson gave the story of the arrest. Smith was arrested at first, and Broome presented himself at the Police Court next day as a witness. Mrs. Atkins was at the Police Court on this occasion and made a statement, which was put in as evidence. In this statement Broome is exonerated from any complicity in the actual assault.

The other evidence presented by the Crown was that of Drs. Primrose, Pickering and Waddy, who officiated on the night of the murder. A number of bruises were found on different parts of the body and some of the organs were found to be in a diseased condition, but all four doctors agreed that the conditions found were not sufficient to account for death. They all agreed further that death was probably the result of shock and two of them (Pickering and Waddy) could think of no other cause.

On the conclusion of the case for the Crown, Mr. Robinson submitted that there was no evidence to go to the jury as against either of the prisoners. His Lordship decided not to take the case from the jury, and the defence was entered upon.

The only witness called before adjournment was John Baker, who testified to having seen Smith about midnight on the night of the alleged assault. This was on Chestnut-street and the prisoner was there in company with a woman.

The case will likely be finished today. The evidence for the defence is principally medical. Kramer formally acquitted. At the same time this morning the man Kramer who made the plates which figured in the recent forgery case, was formally acquitted.

Dickie freed and again jailed. Arthur, Dickie, who was acquitted on Thursday of the murder of his wife yesterday morning, formally acquitted of the charge of having set fire to the house in which she met her death. He enjoyed but a brief spell of freedom, however. He was at once re-arrested on a charge of having set fire to another house near Mimico about two years and a half ago.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL BOARD. Number of Matters Disposed of Yesterday.

At the regular meeting of the Industrial School Board yesterday afternoon it was decided not to enlarge the school paper, "Our Boys," at present.

The Executive Committee recommended the purchase of certain supplies, and the payment of a number of accounts. The aggregate of the accounts was \$1840.23. The report was adopted.

A report with reference to the apprenticing of some of the pupils was also adopted.

A resolution was adopted instructing the secretary to prepare a report for the next meeting upon the number of boys who have been apprenticed since the last report, showing the number who have turned out satisfactorily, as well as those who have not done well.

The chairman announced that permission had been obtained for taking up of a collection in the Public Schools in aid of the Home Memorial Fund.

The question of allowing the superintendent to pay a visit to some American industrial schools for the purpose of inspecting their discipline and management, was left with the Finance Committee.

Yesterday morning the certificate for the promotion and other examinations were presented at the school. The record shows that only two or three schools in South York are doing work on the same high plane.


