STOCK EXCHANGE

British Securities Active As Result of Election.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—Business spread throughout the stock exchange this morning in consequence of the sweeping Conservative victory in the parliamentary elections. The activity peaked at the close last evening continued to-day, when an accumulation of orders posted overnight from the provinces and outlying districts and those who had fled from the continent came in for execution through the brokers. They embraced practically all kinds of securities and industrial shares. Professional operations in the more speculative issues were also more confident with the elimination of the risk to capital generally. The market was having a busy time for some months.
