EAST LONDON ASSURED OF NEW HIGH SCHOOL IF ONLY ONE BUILT DURING 1925

Trustees. However, Will Urge Council To Grant Debentures For Two High Schools, So That South London May Be Accommodated.

Although the 1925 Board of Educaion will strongly urge the building once more. of two new collegiate institutes in the city this year it will choose the East End in preference to South London resolutions. if the Council grants debentures for unit. This is the conviction of many of the school trustees and it oincides with the resolution passed by

Trustee S. F. Lawrason, who is conceded to be the chairman of the new board, declares that there is no doubt of the fact that the East End will get the first new Collegiate. "East London is the logical district for a new secondary school," he stated. "The needs there are very great and the students are no better off than they were last year. Conditions at the old Princess avenue building are deplorable, both as to overcrowding and sanitation. A year ago the board unanimously decided that the East End over a couple of geese. Each big goose should get the first new Collegiate was killed. and I don't think there has been any change in the situation since then."

SITE PURCHASED. South London Collegiate, the trustees point out, is admittedly a temporary proposition, but it is much more satisfactory than East London. Italian Fined For Attacking

Elderly Fellow Countryman. BOARDING HOUSE FRACAS

Explanation Given On Knife-Carrying Charge.
