Besides the examination marks throughout the second and third terms the staff out the second and third terms the staff considered prepared home work, requir-ed work in science and art. For matriculation into the Universities

and learned professions all the work of the Lower School is required, together with Latin, French, Chemistry and Phy-sics as required options—that is two out of four. For the examinations into Norof four. For the examinations into Normal or into the Faculty of Education the Lower School examination is compulsory and for the Faculty of Education Latin also is compulsory. Thus it will be seen that all parents or guardians who allowed their students to drop Latin or French or any part of the work in the Lower School which is not an examination subject they did a deep wrong to the student. The staff are the best judges of a student's needs, so that when parents interfere with the course of study prescribed they hamper class work and injure the future needs of their children. The demands of the Department of Education are rightly being raised year by year to crush indolence in students and compel them to take some reasonable stand in vocational work. Boys or girls fifteen years of age ought to know what is in them, ought to possess fair habits of self control and ought to know what they can best do in life. We have too many misfits from forcing habits of paients and educationists. Boys and girls must be helped to discover themselves and then use their powers to the uttermost toward success. The recent examinations were not unreasonably hard for students who are

faithful in work throughout the school year. A total of 60 per cent of the aggregate marks and 60 per cent total of successful candidates are not high standards. A student with push, plod and pluck can readily obtain first class honors throughout. This trinity of P's, must become the basis of work among the students of the Watford High School if the school is ever to become a scholarship school. There are between \$600.00 and \$800.00 which a student may win in scholarships in the different subjects for university matriculation. In former years the Watford High School has had as clever boys and girls as any school in the courtry. It is the prime duty of each student to put forth the highest and best energies to bring personal success and add to the good name of the school and to ever enhance its honor.

The students who failed to hand in the required field work in science and the work in art have been valued according to their failure to meet requirements; a school must have but one standard—what is fair for one is fair for all. Anything short of this creates confusion, mars ideals and invites failure. Business is business. Mr. R. N. McKenzie, 5. A. is a graduate of Torouto University and is a specialist with first class honors in mathematics. His valued services are secured for the Department of Mathematics for the coming year. Each member of the staff has a high scholastic standing in his or her respective department. The school is well manned and well equipped and the Board of Education are earnest and desirous to make the Watford High School a centre of high ethical and intellectual upliftment to the people of East Lambton in particular and Lambton county in general. We never rise above our ideals, hence it becomes necessary that our ideals he soundly sane, healthy and reasonably high. In answer to this, I think I have clearly shown to the contrary and could give many other instances. (2) "And then we are told that the town is saving his salary." "This is a penny wise and pound foolish reason. Any constable in Watford who does his duty, and has proper support, can earn every cent of his salary, and if he could not earn it all how much would the difference be on the taxes of the people, who would realize "that they had someone to enforce law and order, and upon whom they could depend for protection.
