NEW COURT SCHEDULE FOR COUNTY JUDGES

By virtue of the amendment to the county judges' Act, passed in 1921, by which the counties of Middlesex, Lambton and Oxford were amalgamthe snowy head-robe and shining ated for purposes of administration of justice courts, a calendar of divis-

ion courts has been arranged, by which Judge Taylor, of Lambton, will take a number of London sittings to the description of her blindness, and Judge Judd will occupy the bench at several Lambton sittings. No arrangements have yet been made as far as Oxford county is concerned. Judge Taylor will preside at six division courts in London during the year and Judge Judd will take four division courts in Sarnia, two in Petrolia and two in Watford.

Arrangements as to a circuit of county courts have not been completed. It is likely that there will be exchange of courts during the year, however.

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


