**HAMILTON, ONT.**—The inspector of the Fire Underwriters' Association has drawn attention to the need for a supply reservoir for the waterworks. — The Board of Education have decided to modify the plans for proposed Mary street school so as to reduce the cost. — A. W. Peene, architect, has been granted a permit for a four-storey brick factory for the Howell Lithographing Co., to cost \$10,000. — The Otis Elevator Co., of New York, are forming a Canadian company and will establish a modern elevator plant. They have in the meantime leased the Leitch & Turnbull works in this city.

**OTTAWA, ONT.**—The new church to be built by the Glebe Presbyterians will cost about \$20,000. — It is understood that A. Meyer, of New York, has purchased the Howe property on Rideau street for building purposes. — Tenders are invited by James Davidson, Chairman Board of Works, up to May 28th, for construction of 7,100 lineal feet tile pipe sewer in Dalhousie ward and 810 lineal feet 12-inch tile pipe sewer on Chapel street. — Building permits have been granted as follows: Ottawa Gas Co., brick building for gas works, Cumberland street, cost \$15,000; C. W. Bangs, brick residence, Frank street, cost \$5,000; Ottawa Collegiate Institute Board, stone addition to Institute, Lisgar street, cost \$22,500; A. F. Hurdman, two brick veneer dwellings, Henderson avenue, cost \$3,000; S. J. Davis, double brick veneered tenement, cost \$2,600.

**WINNIPEG, MAN.** — The Western Implement Mfg. Co. will commence work at once on the establishment of a plant. F. J. C. Cox is secretary. — The city will invite competitive plans for proposed Carnegie library to be built on corner of Ross avenue and Princess street. Three prizes will be given. — The authorities of Zion church are likely to sell the present edifice and build a new one on a location further south and west. — J. Robinson & Co. purpose building extensive additions to their business premises. — Fullames & Holmes have sold the McIntyre rink and will erect a new one, at a cost of about \$14,000.
