Agricultural.

NEW Use of the Tomato.—The Cheraw (S. C.) Gazette, states, that in addition to the advantages of toinato for table use, the vine is of great value as food for cattle, especially for cows. It is said that a cow fed on tomato vines will give more milk, and yield butter of a finer flavor, and in greater abundance, than any other long-feed ever tried. It is thought, too, that more good food for cattle, and at less ex pense, can be raised on a given quantity of ground planted with tomatoes, than from any other vegetable known in the southern country

Accuracy among Nurserymen - F. K., Phonix, an intelligent and accurate cultivator residing at Delevan, Wisconsin, gives the following just remarks:—" Let me tell nurserymen that if they would live and flourish in this age, they must be correct. To DETECT INDIAN MEAL IN WHEAT -This process is thus described in a French journal of Medical Chemistry by M. Mauviel La Grange .- The sample is sifted and two grammes (30) grams of the finest flour mixed in a test tube with 4 grammas of nitric acid, and well stirred with a glass rod. After this add 60 grammes of water, and then 2 grammes of carbonate of potash dissolved in S grammes water. When no Indian meal is present, as soon as the carbonic acid has escaped, only yellow flakes seperate; but when this is present, some orange yellowish particles subside, which are easily detected. In this way an admixture of from 4 to 5 per cent. of Indian meal with wheaten flour may be detected.

SALTING MANURE .- Mixing salt with stable and other manures has a good tendency to prevent the development of grubs and vermin, which are frequently bred in dung when carried unsalted to the field.
