Jean-Bertrand Aristide President of Haiti

Jean-Bertrand Aristide was born on July 15, 1953, in Port-Salut. He graduated from Collège Notre-Dame in Cap-Haïtien and pursued graduate studies in philosophy and psychology. He also travelled to Rome and spent two years studying theology in Israel. In 1983, he returned to Haiti for his ordination as a Roman Catholic priest.

Mr. Aristide became Haiti's first democratically elected President in 1991, but was removed from office in a military coup seven months later. He was restored as President in 1994 and completed his term in 1996. He went on to form the Aristide Foundation for Democracy, which sponsors forums on public issues, supports literacy programs, and fosters community-based economic initiatives.

Re-elected President of Haiti in November 2000, Mr. Aristide took office on Feb. 7, 2001.

Carlos Roberto <u>Flores</u> Facussé President of Honduras

Carlos Roberto Flores Facussé was born in Tegucigalpa on March 1, 1950. He obtained a bachelor's degree in industrial engineering at Louisiana State University and pursued postgraduate studies in international economy and finance. Mr. Flores is a former professor at the Central American Superior School of Banking and the school of business administration at the National University of Honduras. He has been a director of the Central Bank of Honduras, the Honduran Institute of Social Security, and the National Institute of Professional Training.

Mr. Flores has carried out various assignments for the Liberal Party and is a former President of the National Congress. Elected President of Honduras in November 1997, Mr. Flores took office on Jan. 27, 1998. He is married and has two children.
