COST TO TAXPAYER FOR ELECTION JULY 8, 1974

### Question No. 44-Mr. Coates:

1. What was the cost to the taxpayer for the federal election of July 8, 1974?

2. Of that total amount, how much was required for (a) the operations of the Chief Electoral Officer (b) the production of the various forms, including ballots, used in the election (c) the payment of returning officers and their staffs (d) the hiring of enumerators and other similar type officials (e) advance poll and election day staff?

3. Of the total number of candidates involved in the July 8 federal election, how many lost their deposits (a) by political party (b) by province?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (President of the Privy Council): The answer in so far as the Office of the Chief Electoral Officer is concerned is: 1. The firm figure will not be available for several weeks but is estimated to be of the order of \$29,000,000.

2. Pending a compilation of a firm figure respecting Part 1 of the question, no meaningful estimate can be made respecting this Part of the question.
