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HOUSING

MEASURES TO STIMULATE CONSTRUCTION—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Stan Darling (Parry Sound-Muskoka): Madam Speaker, I rise on a matter of some urgency under the provisions of Standing Order 43. The Housing and Urban Development Association of Canada indicated yesterday that hundreds of builders are being forced into bankruptcy by a serious slump in the construction industry, arising from record high mortgage rates. Many builders have gone out of business in the past two years and, lately, hundreds have just disappeared.

In light of the fact that HUDAC has forecast that by the end of this year housing starts in Canada will be 8 per cent below their January forecast of 179,500 units to 165,000 units, and that it estimates 220,000 housing starts per year are needed to satisfy demand, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Simcoe North (Mr. Lewis):

That the minister responsible for Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation recognize the rapidly growing disaster in the housing industry and place strong pressure on his government colleagues either to lower interest rates immediately or to establish mortgage interest as a deductible expense for income tax purposes.
