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on the issue once and for all. Mr. Speaker, I would also ask that Air Canada, from now on, use its licence to cover the route Sept-Îles-Quebec City-Montreal, and Montreal-Quebec City-Sept-Îles, in order to compete with the existing service, because at the present time, both the North Shore and the South Shore have no choice but to fly Quebecair, and it is impossible to get decent service.

Even if the region is experiencing economic problems, it is not right that two companies that are financed by Quebec taxpayers should keep these people in a state of deprivation as far as air services are concerned and for such a long time.

YOUTH UNEMPLOYMENT

EQUALITY NOW REPORT RECOMMENDATIONS—NEW DEMOCRATIC PARTY SUPPORT

Hon. Edward Broadbent (Oshawa): Mr. Speaker, it is unusual for Party Leaders to participate in this time period which is normally used by other Members of the House, but I do so today because of the great importance of the subject matter. I refer to the report by an all-Party committee of the House entitled Equality Now. It is a report that concerns the multicultural nature of our country.

These include: first, the creation of a full fledged Department of Multiculturalism with its own Deputy Minister; second, the establishment of a permanent Standing Committee on Multiculturalism in the House of Commons; third, affirmative action programs for the visible minorities in the Public Service; fourth, the establishment of CRTC guidelines to prevent stereotypical and inadequate portrayal of visible minorities in the media.
