In raising young apple trees, the stocks should be seedlings, and not suckers, as the latter furnish less perfect roots. Transplanting apple trees is generally performed with far too little care; though their hardiness will enable them to endure bad management, the thriftiness from good treatment far more than compensates all additional labour. For several years after young trees are transplanted, the ground should be constantly cultivated. This is easily performed so long as the trees remain small. When they become large, an occasional cultivation, with intervening crops of grass, may be sufficient for extensive orchards. It is a common practice to neglect not only cultivation but *pruning*. Irregular and stunted trees, and small and inferior fruit are the consequence. These may be prevented by moderate, frequent and judicious pruning, if the trees are not already too old. Pruning should never be done in Spring when the sap is flowing, but may be performed either in Winter or in Summer.
