DR. J. L. HUGHES ON **VOTES FOR WOMEN**

Are More Entitled to It Than Foreigners Who Cannot Read, He Claims.

"Woman Suffrage" was the subject of an address delivered by Dr. James L. Hughes to the Riverdale Business Men's Association last night in St. John's Pres-byterian Church schoolroom, Broadview

avenue.
In opening, Mr. Hughes stated that a suffrage, as they believe it contrary to the teachings of the Bible. "That is not so," he said. "God said women were to be helpmates to men, which would mean they were to be placed on a level with them." A helpmate, according to two leading theologians known to the doctor, meant someone who would be able to help in the work of the kingdom, and he thought that if woman became subordinate to man she would be simning.

"A woman has individuality and responsibility," said the speaker, "and it is her duty to use both."
