

"Nothing is the same today as it was a year ago," the speaker said, "and nothing will ever be the same." He spoke of the rise and fall of all the great nations in past history, and asked whether it were possible that Great Britain had reached the height of power and was now about to begin her fall. "But," he continued, "the British Empire is not composed of so many thousand acres of land, which, after all, is but mud. The British Empire is composed of men, men who have inherited a great tradition, a great ideal for liberty and honor. We could have stood to see our empire lose so much land, but we could never see her lose her honor and still find it worth while to call ourselves British.

Has Not Preached It.

"We know now that the empire to which we belong has not reached the height of her power or glory, but has still a message which we can give our children. There is still something we can say in after years that Britain drew her sword in the name of honor. We had no alternative but peace with a loss to our honor, or this war with a stainless honor. No, the old flag will by as proudly as ever."

Dr. Endicott then dealt with the Christian side of the war, saying that he had heard people say that religion was dead and was in the scrap heap.

"We are told that we have gone back to the heathenish days since we let lose the hound of war. I receive this statement very slowly." he said. "If Christianity could be killed by war it would have been killed 1900 years ago." He pointed out that Belgium loday stood in the same place as Palestine did thousands of years ago. Every war during the past thousand years had been fought in Belgium, and it would continue to be the bat-lefield of Europe.


