REVISED N. H. A. RULES

Will Vote Against the Free Shot Will Likely Be Found With the and Overtime Rules -Hockey Gossip.

An Ottawa despatch says: The Ottawa Hockey Club, at its weekly meeting last night, went on record as opposing the proposed changes in the N.H.A. playing rules, and decided to vote against their adoption at the next league meeting. The officers of the club believe that the proposed free shot rule, instead of climinating fours by defence players, will increase them when close in on the net, it being pointed out that, it is almost impossible for a player to score when shooting from a stationary position.

The overtime rule on points system in case of the games being tied, met with strong opposition, the local club being in favor of playing twen.y-minute overtim periods, with a ten-minute rest, until the tie is broken.


