charged to solicit your attention; and beg to renew my application for the appointment of a Suffragan Bishop in the Diocese of Quebec, upon the footing stated in my former letter. Whatever may be the ultimate character of the more general ecclesiastical arrangements in the Canadas, the necessity for this particular measure (which carries with it no expence to His Majesty's Government, and, as I have been given to understand, is not conceived by Government to envelop any objection) has, I trust, been made sufficiently apparent: and I have received letters from the Bishop of Quebec expressive of his anxiety to be speedily informed, that provision is made for his relief. take the liberty of adding, that there are reasons which render it particularly desirable that time should be afforded to put all matters connected with this arrangement in satisfactory train, before I am myself obliged to leave this Country.
