

Lord's Supper. I preached on the ordination, and addressed the confirmed, and the whole congregation. I was nearly exhausted by the heat, but the happiness of Dr. Jarvis was reviving, and it was impossible not to join in his fervent gratitude to God. We drove nine miles for an afternoon service at Cocaigue, where one hundred and fifty persons, most of whom had been with us in the morning, were assembled ; and the church, a very creditable building, was consecrated, with its burial-ground, and named after St. Alban. I preached again. Before the conclusion of the service, the rain, which had threatened for some time, fell heavily. Mr. Bacon and Mr. Hudson here left me, after giving me their affectionate attention and kind assistance during all my employments in this eastern portion of New Brunswick, and proceeded a few miles on their return to Chatham. I returned with Dr. Jarvis to another late dinner at his parsonage.

DORCHESTER.—SACKVILLE.—WESTCOCK.

Monday, August 21.—After a visit to Mrs. Hannington, the widow of the amiable and most liberal and pious founder of the Church in this part of the province, I left Shediac, accompanied by Dr. Jarvis, Mr. Black, and Mr. Townshend, and arrived at Dorchester, (twenty-five miles,) for a service at three o'clock. A very neat church was consecrated, and named Trinity ; nineteen persons were confirmed ;
