IMPRINT SHOWSHER CLASS AND WINNERS HANDICAP EVENT

Beats Some Best Two-Year-Olds
at Jacksonville—Oakland and
Juarez Results.

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 23.—At Moncrief
to-day imprint again demonstrated her
class by winning the fourth race, a hand-
icap at six furlongs, in which a number
of the best two-year-olds gathered here,

end Sale But Prices Are Low.

The attendance at the week end sale
