STAND BY OLD ROUTELook to the Future and a Street
Car Line—Members Unanimous
—Citizens Pleased.

NORTH TORONTO, Oct. 3.—(Special.)—Courteously, yet firmly, and with unanimous and as the voice of one man, the town council tonight threw out the suggestion emanating from the Toronto Bural Co. looking to the substitution of another road through Mount Pleasant Cemetery from that already ratified by the ratifiers and the legislature. The question is not by any means a new one, but it is a new phase thru the action of the Bural Co. which has been determined upon the town of its acceptance of the scheme.

Last night the parallel road committee, with Chairman Lawrence, met and talked it all over, and this afternoon Mayor Brown, Councillors Macdonald and Howe and Engineer James made a careful personal examination of the proposed road, going in at Mount Pleasant, skirting the easterly side of the old and disused Bural Co. road, away to the east and so back again to the town and the legislature. The question is not by any means a new one, but it is a new phase thru the action of the Bural Co. which has been determined upon the town of its acceptance of the scheme.

The plan to change the road they came back with those moving materials strengthened and solid in their desire and determination to stand by the old route.

The scheme is almost identical to the one that suggested two years ago by the Bural Co., and which was at that time so distasteful to the town council of North Toronto.

Starting in at Mount Pleasant, where the Mount Pleasant road, or as it is generally known, the "Parallel-road," terminates, the party first examined the approach from the north, which did not strike them at all favorably, only a narrow strip of land, the highway and the belt line from Mount Pleasant, this narrow strip extends for 40 or 40 rods east, after which the highway is taken, the road striking away to the east to a distance at the old Moore Park Bridge of 200 feet, over half a mile from Mount Pleasant.

At this point a serious curve, the roadway occurs, and in addition, the bridge, which is a township structure, is in a dangerous condition, and would require to be wholly rebuilt.

Another phase of the situation was the fact that the Bural Co. had the depth of one lot along the entire line of the Belt Line Railway, from the rear fronting on the railway and the front on the railway.

From Moore Park westerly the party proceeded to Constancia and Lyall streets, past the Eaton Athletic grounds, and in town of North Toronto, York Township Council closed two streets, receiving another to the east in lieu thereof. They then walked to the starting point on Mount Pleasant.

As showing the advantage in favor of the old straight line, the Mount Pleasant line occupied in the return trip was made in about five minutes as against fully fifteen of twenty minutes in going around by way of the proposed diversion. That the parallel road ultimately goes east to Mount Pleasant, in order to get into the city is not taken as a serious objection as the road traveled under the road adopted by the ratifiers runs thru a fine residential district, whereas the new one is a singularly unfitted in all respects to serve the general public. In short the advantages were so great in favor of adhering to the scheme as originally agreed upon that when it came to the council table to night it simply went thru with a rush.

The upshot of the whole thing will be that granting as they did on Monday permission for the immediate construction of the work in any event no matter which road was chosen, York Township have practically given their sanction to the early construction of the work. That it will be prosecuted with vigor goes without saying, indeed this was one of the conditions of agreement between the Bural Co. and the Town of North Toronto and council are a unit in keeping faith with the cemetery trust.

The action of council gave the liveliest satisfaction to the big crowd present at tonight's meeting, as well as to the average ratifier in town. It is not thought that in any event further internecine will take place on the east of the belt line, indications all pointing to a reversal of action by the cemetery along this procedure.

The bridge over the belt line at Mount Pleasant, said Engineer James today, will cost \$10,000 for cement work, to say nothing of iron and the cost of depressing the road will be heavy, but the council of North Toronto are looking to the future of the town, not the immediate present, and the property owners by an overwhelming majority have endorsed their action.

All that remains now is for Engineer James and council to give a good live

demonstration of rapid efficient road

building.

Nicholas Gearland appeared with respect

to the matter of a fixed assess-

ment on his property, charging that two

sewers instead of one were being placed

thru his property, and asking for a con-

firmation of the agreement drawn up by

his solicitor, which was in effect a fixed

assessment for a term of years.

"What will you take in lieu of a fixed

assessment for the sewer easement on your

property," Mr. Gearland, asked the

mayor. "Twenty-five thousand dollars,"

answered Mr. Gearland without a

moment's hesitation. The town fathers

were seized with heart failure to a man,

and after some little further parleying

the whole question was laid over for a

while to give the members time to re-

cover.

Another matter that came up as a

notice of motion was one by Councillor

Lawrence relating to the question of a

honorary fireman and the council.

It sets out that, in view of the heavy work

of council, the changing of the hours of

meeting to the first and third Saturdays

of each month, in the afternoon, with an

allowance of \$20 a year, payable monthly,

a similar amount goes to the mayor.
