

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

CITY WILL BE DIVIDED INTO 2 POLICE DISTRICTS

**Will Necessitate Appointment of
Another Detective and About
Fifteen Patrolmen.**

HAMILTON, Ont., Oct. 17. (Special.)—The long-deferred division of the city into two police districts will take place next Monday, when the new Sherman-avenue station will be opened. The headquarters for the eastern division, 111, Inspector Coulter, who has been promoted from the position of detective, in charge. The western division will be in charge of Deputy Chief of Police Whately, ex-Deputy Chief of Police, and Patrol Sergeants May and Gibbs will be attached to the east end station. Sergeants Tucker and Settles, who were recently promoted to the ranks, will remain in the west.

The reorganization of the police force will make necessary the appointment of another detective, as well as about 15 patrol men.

Wife Bester Sentenced.

Mike Seban, the foreigner charged last week with brutally beating his wife because she refused to provide him with money with which to leave Hamilton, was sentenced to two months in jail this morning by Police Magistrate Jelfs. The cad had evidently entertained the notion of having the law applied to Seban, and told the foreigner if he was again brought up on such a charge he would not get off easy.

George Kennough, whose name has been so closely connected with the \$3000 express robbery case, appeared before Judge Monck in county court this morning, on the charge of stealing \$1000 from his former employers, the Canadian Express Co. His counsel, W. H. Wardrobe, K.C., declined to elect, and the prisoner was remanded for an indefinite period. The date of his trial will be set probably by agreement between his counsel and the crown attorney.

It is said that Kennough's wife and children are in needy circumstances. They live in Dundas, Kennough's former home.

Many Assessments Appealed.

Six hundred and ninety-nine appeals have been entered against the assessments recently completed on Hamilton property. This is nearly 300 more than were made against last year's assessment figures, and the conclusion is drawn that the assessors this year have, therefore, done their work in a more satisfactory manner. The assessment commissioner is among the applicants this year, he not being satisfied in the case of some property owned by J. J. Scott, which was put at \$1900 an acre, while the owner refused to sell for three times that price to the board of education.


