WILL STRIKE TODAY.

Carpenters at U. S. Naval Base and Depots Demand Pay be Raised.

Norfolk, Va., March 31.—Carpenters and joiners employed at the Hampton Roads naval base the Pig Point ordnance Depot, and the Bush Bluff army depot, voted at a meeting held here tonight to strike tomorrow unless their demands for higher wages and an eight-hour day are granted by the government.

Union leaders said between five and six thousand men would go out.
