KING EDWARD HOTEL SALE COMPLETED

New Management Takes Possession This Morning.

MAY BE CHANGES

Backers of Project Are for Great Part Toronto Men.

The United Hotels Company of America takes formal possession of the King Edward Hotel this morning at 7 o'clock. Saturday afternoon papers for the sale of the hotel by the United Hotels Company were signed, and the link in the chain of big hotel which extends throughout North America. The King Edward Hotel and the Royal Canadian Hotel are as yet the only two Canadian hotels on the company's system.

The United Hotels Company purchased the King Edward Hotel for \$1,000,000. The first payment was \$500,000 in ten years, five per cent. The balance of \$500,000 was paid in cash. The financing of the hotel purchase was arranged by A. H. Martens and Company, and W. S. Dimmick and Company. These two concerns placed the entire bond issue.

The hotel is to be substantially changed in its interior fittings and decorations. The money to complete the purchase and to pay for these changes was divided by an issue of \$700,000 second mortgage, 15 year seven per cent bonds. With these bonds the company gave a bonus of 40 per cent of the capital stock of the company. The bond mortgage total \$1,500,000 and are closed. The common stock issue authorized is a million dollars, of which the total capitalization of the new King Edward Hotel Company is two and a half million dollars, while the capitalization of the hotel under new management was well over \$4,000,000.

Controls Common Stock.

The controlling company is known as the King Edward Hotel Company, while the hotel is under the management of the United Hotels Company of America, which controls the common stock of the King Edward Hotel Company. Under the arrangement the United Hotels Company does not get a cent out of the King Edward unless it makes the hotel a dividend payer because the parent company simply holds common stock.

Starting at 7 o'clock this morning the hotel will be managed by George O'Neill, manager of the Royal Canadian Hotel, Hamilton. He is a Canadian, and well known as a successful manager under temperance conditions. A local manager will be appointed under Mr. O'Neill. Mr. O'Neill will exercise general supervision over the two hotels.

The King Edward will have the benefit of the new management. The hotel system, and the officers of that system claim that it will earn dividends the first year.

Structural Changes.

The structural changes contemplated immediately are the building of 45 new rooms, bringing the hotel's capacity to 425. There will also be substantial changes in other parts of the hotel. First-class grill rooms will be installed. The hotel will also have a cafeteria and a business men's lunch. The hotel will be made the social centre of the city, and will be managed throughout on the most approved American plans.

With the exception of the stock held by the United Hotels Company, the backers of the hotel are Toronto men. After having secured the sanction of the minister of finance to the issue, A. H. Martens and Col. W. S. Dimmick, along with Frank A. Dudley, president of the United Hotels Company, set about to raise the additional money necessary for the completion of the purchase.
