Edmund Bristol, M.P., after a two months' inspection of the mining camps of the Yukon and Northern British Columbia, has returned to Toronto imbued with the spirit of the west. It is impossible to form any conception of the west without having seen it, he observed in discussing the wheat yield. The most one learns in the press is the fact that barely five per cent, of the arable land is under cultivation, and this comparatively small area is proregarded as an exclusively ranching country, produces two million bushels.
