MARRIAGE LAW IS VALID

DECLARES ATTY.-GENERAL

Amendment of Legislature Deals Only With Parties Wedding Under Lawful Age.

Attorney-General Foy yesterday made a statement to the press in reply to a despatch from Ottawa to the effect that the amendment to the marriage act passed at the last session of the legislature is unconstitutional.

A few days ago Ellen Faskien originated an action in the courts to have her marriage with Henry Foy declared invalid on the ground that both are minors, and were married without the consent of their parents, basing her claim to a dissolution of the union on the Ontario amendment.

Mr. Foy states: "Before the young girl, who is seeking relief in the Ontario High Courts, commenced action she obtained the opinion of two eminent counsel that the act was within the jurisdiction of the province. The act purported to give power to the court to annul a marriage, it would be ultra vires, as the Dominion parliament alone, as the provincial legislatures have exclusive jurisdiction under the B.N.A. Act as to the solemnization of marriage, and provincial act does not deal with divorce or annulment of a marriage, but only treats of the case where a form of marriage is gone thru between two persons under the lawful age, without consent required by law, and where no valid marriage was effected in Ontario. The act does not purport to give the court power to annul a marriage, but only to find (if the fact be so) that a valid marriage has not been entered into or effected, and so to declare.

"When this act was before the Ontario legislature it was foreseen that some one hunting for flaws might possibly throw a doubt on the jurisdiction of the Ontario legislature, and in order to remove any possible question it was suggested that a similar act should be passed by the Dominion parliament, as a matter of precaution.

"The correspondent is mistaken in saying the bill introduced into the Ontario parliament last session was of the request of the provincial government. There was no request but merely a suggestion to those interested in the legislation that if a similar act were passed at Ottawa there would be no room for any one of the law-hunters to suggest a shadow of a doubt as to the sufficiency of the legislation."

Vendors Block Public.

Superintendent Beck of the Union Station has written the board of control complaining that the carts of bananas and peanut vendors often block the roadway opposite the front-street entrance, preventing passengers in street cars, automobiles, etc., from gaining access. The controllers will have the chief of police report on whether the vendors can be excluded from the neighborhood.

COULDN'T HEAR WHISTLE

BOY KILLED BY TRAIN

Willie Wildbourn Meets Fearful Death on C.N.R. Tracks Along Don.

Unable to hear the shrieking whistle of the Canadian Northern morning express because of his deafness, 14-year-old Willie Wildbourn was struck down and literally ground to pieces beneath the wheels of the engine and cars 250 yards north of the Winchester-street bridge, on the Don flats, at 12:10 o'clock yesterday.

The lad lived with his parents at 177 Hamilton-street.

Coroner W. A. Young opened an inquest at the morgue last night.

Engineer Joseph Merry deposed that the train left under the last coach at time and arrived at Rosedale Station, a short distance north of the place of the accident, on time at 11:40. He had noticed the boy walking on the line alongside the track, and had used the engine whistle vigorously, but suddenly the little fellow stepped on the track.

The train was brought to a stop within 150 feet. Part of the boy's remains were then under the last coach of the train. The head and upper part of the body were found 100 feet away from the rest of the remains.

The freeman, Morrison by name, had also seen the boy step on the track. The bell, he said, had been ringing continuously after the train had left Rosedale.

The engineer declared that the trainmen were having a great deal of trouble in the Don. Not alone do they offend passengers by their rudity, but they also play dangerous pranks on the railway. Mr. Merry said that lately he had found a shoebrake laid on the rails, while iron and stones had also been piled up. The train crews have to be very cautious.

Dr. Young will resume the inquest on Monday evening at 7 o'clock in the city hall, when the Wildbourn family physician will be asked to testify concerning the boy's health and condition of hearing, while the evidence of witnesses other than trainmen will be given.

Wildbourn had been in swimming with Norman Dwight and another boy, but they were not with him when the fatality occurred.
