

An Explanation From Ald, Hanlan.

Editor World: Regarding my supposed opposition to the recent motion of Ald. Spence in the interests of the "nine-hour movement," I desire to say I am not in any way antagonistic to the welfare of the workingmen, and that my record in the City Council has been one of consistent support—of any measure tending towards their benefit. I will continue that support, and I may say that I am in favor of all workingmen, whether employed by the city or on contract labor, receiving not less than \$1.50 per day. I was opposed to the reduction in the hours of labor because I did not think the men could afford to lose the 15 cents per day under the conditions which exist in this city. During my career in the City Council I have endeavored to provide employment on the Island during the winter months by having useful and necessary improvements made for beautifying the Island Park and putting the lagoons in a sanitary condition. I wish it to be distinctly understood that in speaking against the motion of Ald. Spence I did so under misapprehension, not understanding its purpose. When the matter was thoroughly explained to me I recorded my vote in favor of the resolution.

RAILWAYS GRIND THE CONSUMER.

Proposed Increase in Rates to be Heard by the Inter-State Commerce Commission.

New York, Dec. 19 .- As a result of the protests of shippers, the Inter-State Comerce Commission has set a date, December 21, for a hearing on the proposed ad

vance in rallway rates.

The Merchants' Association of the city to The Merchants' Association of the city to-day appointed a committee to represent them at the hearing. The merchants most affected are those who deal in dry goods, and kindred products, including coffee, sugar, soap and hardware. New York merchants claim that the proposed advance is so radical as to create a very serious disturbance in trade relations, restricting the area of distribution of output in factor-les here and in foreign countries, and re-sulting in an increase of cost to the con-sumers.
