### NORMAL SCHOOL CLOSING

Coming School Teachers Bid Farewell to Alma Mater.

The Normal School closed yesterday amid the great rejoicing not only of the kindergarten children, but also of the "will-be" school teachers. In the morning the annual flower festival of the kindergarten classes was held, and was attended by the parents of the little white-gowned fairies who flitted about the room in time with the music. The room was gracefully decorated with marguerites and maple leaves hung in ropes from the centre of the room to the corners.

In the evening the embryo school teachers held their closing. The chair was occupied by Principal Scott, B.A., who said that this year's class was the largest that has ever been in the school, and that some of the students were especially glad that they had come there this year, as next term will be one of ten months instead of five, as was in force. The reason for this, he explained, was because the Minister of Education thought there was too much work for such a short time.

Rev. Prof. Cody delivered the address at the evening. He thought the examinations in the schools were made up principally of such questions, and the student in preparing for them thought of this and left the plain questions to attend to themselves. As a result, business men are complaining that there is a great lack of thoroughness in the schools and it is hard to find a boy who can add, multiply and subtract correctly.

After a short musical program, consisting of songs by Miss Helen Davidson and E. W. Knowles, violin selections by Miss Ethel I. Beath and Robert Cheneau, Miss Devo M. Richardson delivered the valedictory address.

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## YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS

Toronto Junction May Use York County Industrial Home for Indigents.

### ELECTRICIANS VISIT CANADA FOUNDRY

New Lambton Golf Club Formally Opens To-Day—City Happenings.

York County Councilors took a trip over the Metropolitan to Bond's Lake yesterday afternoon, and will close their June session to-day. Yesterday a bylaw was passed authorizing the execution of an agreement with the Town of Toronto Junction, which provides as follows:

1. Toronto Junction is to pay 9 per cent. of the cost of erection and repairs of the Registry Office, and for providing books for the same, and for services of which the county is liable under the provisions of any act respecting the registration of instruments relating to lands.

2. The town is to pay annually to the county 9 per cent. of moneys payable by the county to the Provincial Treasurer on account of the expenses of the Inspector of Land Titles.

3. Toronto Junction may use and enjoy the privileges of the Industrial Home at New Lambton for indigents, who there shall be room in the Industrial Home, and the town shall pay monthly \$1.00 per week for each inmate from the town committed by the Mayor.

4. Toronto Junction is to pay 9 per cent. of the cost of administration of justice, including sums payable to the sheriff of York and Toronto, Crown Attorney for York and Toronto and Crown Attorney for York and Toronto, and also 9 per cent. of the cost of the peace and all coroners, crown witnesses, court clerks, Board of Audit, etc.

5. The town is to pay the county 9 per cent. per day for the maintenance of persons in the County Jail.

6. Toronto Junction is to pay 9 per cent. of the amount of the debentures issued by the county in lieu of annual payment for the occupation of the City Hall for judicial purposes, also 9 per cent. of the cost of the county's portion for furnishing the building on Thursday, July 1, to discuss the matter with this Council.

A similar bylaw was passed in regard to the Town of North Toronto, with the exception, instead of 9 per cent. of the various amounts, North Toronto is to pay 3 per cent.

The Clerk was instructed to purchase copies of the bylaws of the County of York, 1903, for each member of the Council who are not otherwise entitled to them.

When the Council adjourned today it will stand adjourned until Wednesday, July 15, when to meet for the purpose of discussing the bylaw and setting apart a system of county roads. The Clerk was instructed to invite appoint delegates to meet in the Council chamber on Thursday, July 1, to discuss the matter with this Council.

Toronto Junction, June 12.—A special car conveyed about 100 delegates, attending the Canadian Electric Association meeting, to the Canada Foundry Company's works, where they were met by Assistant Superintendent A. C. Campbell, and other officials, who showed them over the immense works now in course of construction, and over the buildings already completed and in operation. Much interest was taken in the various departments, and at 6 o'clock lunch was served in the stove building. J. W. Campbell held charge of the program.

The Board of Health, who were present, last night instructed the inspector to look up paper hangers who persist in throwing waste paper in the lanes. Since December there have been 45 cases of scarlet fever and 14 deaths; 27 cases of diphtheria, and 2 deaths. At present there are two cases of scarlet fever.

The Brotherhood of St. Paul and Anselm Guild will plant at Island Park on Saturday afternoon.

At the Police Court this morning Andrew Dunn, driver, was fined \$10 for driving a motor car without a license, and \$5 for driving a motor car without a license.
