Christiania, Norway, June 9.-The Norwegian tricolor was hoisted this out the country in place of the union flag. The substitution was attended by great ceremony at the fort, where mhers of the storthing were asmbled and 30,000 of the public witnessed the event from points of vantnessed the event from points of variance age. The garrison was paraded in front of the quarters of the commandant of the fort, and the commandant read the resolution of the storthing dissolving the union with Sweden.

As the clock in the tower of the fort chimed ten the union flag, which had floated there since 1814, was hauled down, the troops presented arms, the band played the patriotic air, "Sons of Norway," and after only a momentary interim the first gun of a national salute boomed, the new flag was broken out, and the troops again presented arms. The people then uncovered and cheered wildly, the band adding to the general enthusiasm by playing the popular air, "Yes, we love this country." The whole crowd joined in, after which round after round of cheering again greeted the flag.





mmense Fortune Long Tied up in Litigation, Reads Like a Romance.

Birmingham (Eng.) Post: We recently recalled the famous Jennens, or Jennings, millions, which have defied all claimants for genera ions, and e ferred to the fact that a new claimant from Canada had appea ed on the ce e in David Jennings of Montieal. A f. lend of that gentleman, having himself a direct interest in this strange legal romance, writes us: The history of the great Jennings

The history of the great Jennings chancery case reads like a romance rather than actual fact. Recent researches prove that there is a substantial foundation of truth at its hase, and that the money has accumulated to an enormous amoun—135,000.000—still unclaimed. One is hardly able to realize what that sum is picsents. It would be for the general good of this country if this money were claimed and distributed rather than for to be locked up in chancery, doing no one any good. David Jennings, whose geat grandfather lived at Bloxwich and who has la'ey come four Canada, as already stated, claims to be heir-at-law, and has come to Fng and



to assert his rights. Mr. Jennings has lately been visiting Sydney He b. t, F.R.G.S., of Carlton Lodge, Cheltenham, the classic artist, who is a descendant from Humphrey Jennings of Erdington Hall, thru Mary, granddaughter of Humph.ey, who mar.ied Henry Guest of Kinver. Joseph Guest, Mr. Herbert's grandfather, spent most of his life in collecting proof of his claim to the personal property of William the Rich, and he had an interview with the Hon. He was the richest commoner in England in the time of William III. That monarch was his godfather, and visited him at his Suffolk mansion. A bed was once in existence at Acton Place, the hargings of which were lined with the sheets of William III. William Jennings (known generally as William the Rich) was a man of eccentric habits. He lived a rather misanthropical life, and report says he was disappointed in love, having been filted by some duchess. was a man of eccentric habits. He lived a rather misanthropical life, and report says he was disappointed in love, having been jilted by some duchess. His favorite dog was named The Duchess. When the dog died he had a tomb erected in Acton grounds to the momercy of his canine favorite, and that tomb is still in existence. The arms of William Jennings a.e Az. a chev on between three plummets, sa. The other branches of the family all bear purmets, but differently arrayed, and the crests, too, are not the same. The arms are sculptured on the magnificent marble tomb still in Acton Church. The tomb was erected by Annie Car-w Suidot, the wife of Robert Jennings, father of William, and represents Robert reclining at full length, and leaning over him is the figure of his wife. It is a very fine work of art. The plummets may have a Masonic significance suggesting the upright line of truth and honor, but we have not yet had a very satisfactory explanation of the device. Charles Jennings, another member of this distinguished family, lived in g eat state at Gopsall Hall.
