He circumvented the Tibetan guards, and succeeded, with nine men, in reaching Mansarowar Lake. Here five of his men deserted him, leaving him with only four. Three marches farther on, two of these four turned traitors and carried off all his servants' supplies. Landor pushed on with a bearer (Chanden Sing) and a coolie (Mansing). They crossed Maium Pass, at an altitude of 16,000 feet. While crossing the Nio Tsambo River, one of their yaks upset. The yak was saved, but its valuable load, consisting of all the tinned provisions, 800 rupees in cash, three pairs of shoes, one slaughtered sheep, wearing apparel, razors, skinning instruments, and some 300 rifle cartridges, was lost. This accident was directly the cause of Mr. Landor's capture, as he and his two followers, who were footsore, starving and disheartened, were driven to seek food and horses in a place called Toxem. The people received them with apparent cordiality, and Landor suspected no treachery. While he was picking out ponies offered for sale, the crowd suddenly rushed on the three travelers and cruelly bound them. Tibetan soldiers, who had lain in ambush, took possession of the trio. Chamden Sing, the bearer, was given 200 lashes with whips. Landor was placed on a horse, his seat being a spiked, packed saddle. His erms were still tied. His horse was
