AIRBRAKE EQUIPMENT

BEING ADDED TO TEN

STREET RAILWAY CARS

The London Street Railway Company is equipping ten of its double-truck cars with air brakes, according to announcement made today by Manager C. B. King.

The company, said Mr. King, is pursuing a policy of maintaining its stock and equipment at the highest standard of efficiency. Five of the cars to have the new brake equipment are of the closed type now in service on city lines, while the others are the large open picnic cars used on the Springbank straffic on days of normal travel, that service will be practically completely air-brake equipped.

Five new cars arrived in the city on Wednesday from the makers, and are being unloaded at the London and Port Stanley shops at Philip and Maitland streets. Meanwhile a number of other cars are being rebuilt and repainted at the company's shops on Lyle street.
