WILSON'S PEACE TERMS AT THIS MEMORANDUM OF GREAT IMPORTANCE TO THE WORLD

Freedom to Many Races Now Enslaved; Freedom Even for Austria-Hungary, if Nationalities There Only Realize It—Vital to Americans as to Any Race in the World.

Of the fourteen conditions laid down by President Wilson in his memorable address to Congress, six belong to the deliberations of some international conference after the war. They are non-territorial, save in the case of colonial adjustments; they represent details in the general scheme of a league of nations and the insurance against future conflicts. Of them I shall not speak in this article, not because they are of less importance than the remaining eight, but because they afford no tangible and definite basis for discussion at this time, or until it becomes clear what sort of relations are to exist between the two groups of nations now at war when peace is restored.

Turning directly to those of the president's conditions which deal with territorial adjustments, I desire first of all to discuss briefly the combined effect of all of these conditions upon the grandiose German conception of a Mitteleuropa under Germany's direction and then rapidly to survey each of the conditions separately.

Slits Mitteleuropa. The President's plan in restoring Serbia and Rumania and giving a solid barrier stretching from the Black to the Adriatic Sea between the northern and southern groups of nations which together form the Central Alliance, Mitteleuropa, as the pan-Germans call it, was to be a solid block of territory extending from the Baltic to the Adriatic, above the mouths of the Danube, the Elbe, and the Rhine, and below the mouths of the Danube, the Elbe, and the Rhine, and below the mouths of the Danube, the Elbe, and the Rhine.

Minority in Control. In the scheme of Mitteleuropa the actual territory was to be in the hands of the Germans. Of the 185,000,000 inhabitants dwelling in lands included in the plan only 75,000,000 were actually German by race and tongue. But this minority, this 40 per cent, since they were Germans and thus members of a "superior" race, were to control. With the Germans were allied two other military authorities, but the absolute confidence of the British administration, and that they had allowed a free hand than had ever before been given to soldiers in any war in which the country had taken part.

Would Trouble Germany. In his scheme the German planned to hold all of France which had been conquered, and Belgium, and all of the Russian territories already occupied and, finally, the Balkan states. In Europe alone this represented an area greater than that of Germany herself before the war and a population of 100,000,000. The European empire would represent 75,000,000 square miles, three times that of Germany herself, and it is with this plan in full view that the Germans are negotiating with the British, the French, and the Americans, who have declared against evacuation of conquered territories in advance of the peace conference.

Now President Wilson demands the restoration of Serbia and Rumania. If this is achieved the German Mitteleuropa cuts in half almost at the waist, both banks of the Danube, its main artery, will be in alien hands at the Iron Gate, and the Balkan states will be separated from Austria and Germany. And with such a separation the whole gigantic scheme must collapse.

But the president did not pause here. In addition he demands that Belgium and Northern France, with Alsace-Lorraine be surrendered on the west, and Poland and the Baltic states on the east. This one might say that, having cut the body at the waist, he also amputates the arms. Further than this, by demanding that the outlying districts of Turkey, Armenia, Mesopotamia, and the Baltic states be evacuated, he demands that Germany surrender this dream and evacuate these conquered districts and the whole of her conquests.

Demands Freedom of Europe. In a word, the first issue of the war now is the freedom of Europe, dominated by a measure by the German, as it was by Napoleon a little more than a century ago. Until France was restored to her own rightful limits at the Congress of Vienna, until she was evicted from Belgium, Holland, and Southern Germany, and from the Italian and Spanish peninsulas, all peace was bound to be a truce, and each peace was specially followed by a renewal of the struggle of all other European peoples for freedom from French domination. And the same is true of Germany now.

to attempt to occupy Albania and insist upon the restoration of the old boundaries of 1914. Obviously what the president has in mind is that there shall be restored that old Balkan League which won the first Balkan war and broke down under Austria-Hungary and the second. Could Greece, Bulgaria, and Serbia settle their differences as to Macedonia, if Austria-Hungary had not been had under the guidance of Venizelos if Austria had permitted her ally, the Balkans would cease to be the fighting ground of the great powers, and with Rumania, would make a compact Balkan alliance, which would insure mutual freedom against any other war thrust between the Austro-German mass and the Balkan states, which Germany hoped and hopes to find her colonial place in the sun. It is to break this Austria-Hungary and to break which Austria risked and precipitated the world catastrophe.

Autonomy for Turks. In addition, the president demands for the various subject peoples of Turkey some form of autonomous existence. He would leave that portion of the Turkish empire in Anatolia inhabited by the Osmanli to its present boundaries. For it is only Anatolia. Of more than 70,000,000 people, only 10,000,000 are actually Turkish by race. The rest, slightly less than 60,000,000, are of various nationalities, and include a compact Balkan alliance, which would insure mutual freedom against any other war thrust between the Austro-German mass and the Balkan states, which Germany hoped and hopes to find her colonial place in the sun.

It is not, as many Americans seem to believe, a question of annexation of European frontiers which has been raised. Americans are little concerned with the exact limits at which a Balkan frontier is marked on the maps; the eastern frontier of a truly free Poland may only remotely concern us, but we are all concerned vitally in preventing the erection of an empire in Europe which shall be strong that it can aspire, as it will, to the control of all other continents. American as well as Asiatic, and African. Given the German conception of force and violence, of German superiority, of the German mission to head the world by conquest and then by methods well exemplified in the Balkans, with new energy, vigor, and death that the Germans should not get control of 100,000,000 men of "inferior races" and arm and train from these new and invincible hordes, it is the locality, not the details of the German scheme which threatens all America, and it is to move President Wilson to throw aside our oldest tradition and fight for the sanctification of European frontiers erected by this war.


Only less interesting and important is the president's demand for the restoration of the peoples of Austria-Hungary for autonomous development. I have talked much in these articles about the Slav question in the east; this raises it anew. Today there are within Austrian territory 24,000,000 Slavs, just short of half of the total population. There are also 4,000,000 Czechs, Rumanians and Slovaks, and against these races, held inferior by the ruling minorities, there are 12,000,000 Germans and 10,000,000 Magyars. Today the Magyars and the Germans control Austria-Hungary, with the assistance from the 5,000,000 Poles of Galicia, who, though Slavs, follow national rather than racial lines.

On the race map, it means that in the north, in Bohemia, the majority of the Slavs, Czechs and Slovaks, are denied all real liberty and equal representation, while millions of southern Slavs, from Flume to Cattaro, in Dalmatia, Croatia, Slavonia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, are equally unfortunates. The same is true of the Italians of Trentino and the Rumanians of Transylvania and the Banat. Were President Wilson's demand to be met, the Germans and the Magyars would be a minority in Austria, and the Germans would be in a hopeless minority in their half of the Dual Monarchy. It would appear that the Slavs were this to be done they would still find themselves in a difficult situation. The Slav element gains with each year, and the Germans to obtain equal representation in Austria, which would be a wedge between the Germans and Magyars, and the open sea.

Now, with the Polish question I shall not attempt to lengthen at this time. The president proposes the "erection of an independent Polish state, including territories now under German and Austrian control, with free access to the sea, and with political and economic independence and territorial integrity internationally guaranteed." This would mean at the least the creation of a Polish state, including all of Poland, P. I. of Austrian Galicia, and a considerable portion of Eastern Prussia, including Posen, and portions of East and West Prussia. It would mean, it would mean the return of the rule to Danzig, which is the true Polish seaport. It would mean the creation of a state with close to 30,000,000 square miles, about the size of continental Italy, with a population of at least 20,000,000. But such a state would intervene along the Lower Vistula between the main bulk of German-speaking people and the minority east of the Vistula. It would thus undo the work of Frederick the Great in the first Polish partition.

Turning now to Serbia, the president proposes not merely evacuation, but for Serbia this can mean only that Serbia should have Northern Albania, conquered by her in the first Balkan war, and surrendered at the Conference of London, under German and Austrian pressure, and through the ineffectual folly of Sir Edward Grey, deprived of the Serbian army, and the British insisted upon holding all of Macedonia, including portions assigned to Bulgaria in the 1913 agreement, and this produced the second Balkan war, and led to the present world war.
