## MEN FROM OLYMPIC COMING IN MORNING

Party of 323 Expected Here at 8 o'Clock.

EN ROUTE TO LONDON.  
323 men from Olympic.  
217 from Minneapolis.  
Troops from Canada.

CROSSING ATLANTIC.

Eight officers and 315 men from the Olympic for dispersal in London are expected to reach here at 8 o'clock on Saturday, as the troop train on which they left Halifax was reported at Campbellton, N. B., at noon yesterday.

The train will be switched over from the Grand Trunk to the C. P. R. at Quebec street station and march from there to the dispersal station at Tecumseh Barracks, Lieut.-Col. G. W. Nelson, O. C., the district deputy, expects that the whole party will be dispersed within two hours at the most.

## HUNGARIAN OFFICIALS AT GERMAN-AUSTRIAN NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

Hops for Continuance of Amicable Relations Between Two Peoples.

Copenhagen, March 28.—(Emissaries of the Hungarian revolutionary government handed their credentials to the president of the German-Austrian national assembly at Vienna yesterday, according to a Budapest dispatch received here.)

Hopes for continuance of amicable relations between Hungary and Germany were expressed by the Hungarian delegates also visited the chancellor and the ministers of war and finance at Vienna.

The dispatch states that the revolutionary government has ordered Entente flags hoisted on the hotel where the Entente missions have been staying, and that posters will soon be issued warning the people to respect all foreigners in Budapest.

## GERMAN SECURITIES FOR FOOD PAYMENTS WILL BE EXAMINED

Delegation of Enemy Finances Expected to Reach Paris Soon.

Paris, March 28.—The German delegation of financiers, now at Spa, is expected to arrive soon in Paris to consider questions relating to securities Germany has offered in payment for food. Germany has increased her deposit of gold for relief supplies, and the first cargoes are expected to arrive at Hamburg tomorrow. Neutral banks also been invited to send financial representatives to confer with German officials on the peace conference regarding German securities held in their countries, which might be offered in payment for food. It is understood that an agreement was reached at Brussels last March 14 by which Germany will be permitted to export certain classes of goods in order to pay for food supplies, and that this agreement now becomes effective.

## APPROVE PRESENT

## POSTOFFICE SITE

## Hume Cronyn, M. P., Told of Referendum Result.

In view of the fact that announcement has been made in the press that the Government will proceed this year with the erection of the new postoffice, the directors of the London Chamber of Commerce and of a large percentage of the members on the question has been ascertained.

Favors Present Site.

A referendum vote on the question of the site received to date strongly favors the present site, and immediate action, thus insuring the opinion of the directors that all possible work should be afforded as soon as possible to avoid unemployment in this demobilization centre. The following are copies of telegrams exchanged between the Chamber of Commerce and Major Hume Cronyn, M. P.:

The Query.

London, March 21, 1919.

House of Commons, Ottawa.

Unquestioned rumor here says no start will be made on postoffice this year. "Is there anything we can do to expedite matters?" As demobilization centre we will find great difficulty in avoiding unemployment.

The Answer.

Gordon Philip, Chamber of Commerce, London.

No provision in main estimates for new postoffice. Will be considered for supplementary estimates. It is thought opinion in London dividing on the question of location. Has the Chamber of Commerce reached any definite decision on this point.

The Explanation.

London, March 26, 1919.

Parliament Buildings, Ottawa.

Yours 21 postoffice. Directors strongly favor building on present site. Referendum to all members today. Result Monday. Citizens generally believe present site already decided, and consider city hall situation a different and local affair.

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## CANADIAN SOLDIERS PROTECTED S. A. HEADQUARTERS

## Commissioner Howard Tells of Occurrences There and Discusses Cause and Effect—Has Faith That Britain Will Emerge More Democratic Than Ever.

He looks like a Kentucky colonel, with his grey hair, snowy chin beard, clear, twinkling eyes, skin as fresh as that of vigorous youth, and straight, slender, athletic figure.

In reality, he is Commissioner T. Henry Howard, chief of the staff of the Salvation Army, London, England, and that he couldn't possibly be anything but English, if he is a high official in an army that knows no national boundaries.

Three score and ten years he confesses to, as he tells that he is on a faraway tour around the world in the interests of the Salvation Army, yet he scarcely looks 50.

Work in the world when it is associated with contentment and peace of mind, he says, as he tells that he is "stepping down from the saddle to let a younger man take his place and carry on during the period of the five or six years, or perhaps more, than the problems of war." When he goes back to England he expects for the remainder of his years to give the benefit of his 35 years' experience in the army to the cause, somewhat in the capacity of Japan's "elder statesmen," so he says himself.

For an hour or so this forenoon he talked forcefully and illuminatingly of the problems of the world, with special reference to Britain and her colonies.

Studying Big Questions.

Prominent among these problems discussed were the future of industry, safeguarding democracy, and minding democracy safe, and demobilization.

"I came over in the Adriatic to Canada," he said, "with 2,000 Canadian men returning home. As I watched them day after day for ten days I was struck by the fact that they were such fine, upstanding fellows, 'men with heads,' I called them. I said two things to myself about these men. First, 'Canada can be proud of that lot,' and secondly, 'The Canadian Government will have its hands full with that lot of men.'"

This statement, brought upon the commissioner's head a question concerning the disturbance at Rhyll. He had just left Liverpool before it occurred, but Commissioner Richards, chief officer for Canada, who was present, had a letter just received from the Salvation Army chaplain at Rhyll, Capt. Penfold, telling of the riot, and of the fact that the men were taking upon themselves to protect the Salvation Army headquarters, and the Salvation Army women workers were stationed.

Protected S. A. Quarters.

At the time of the outbreak, Capt. Penfold was on his way to the Salvation Army hut, when he heard a shot fired. His first surprise was "that some cool-farmer was shooting at a Salvation Army hut." Just then he saw a man running with a red flag immediately after the man was shot down. A Salvation Canadian was standing sentinel over the doctor's house, and the man, when asked who had appointed him to do so, he replied that the men were going to see that the Salvation Army women workers were protected.

When Gen. Hunter came down to Rhyll from London, he tried to settle the trouble, according to Capt. Penfold, but the Salvation Army was their friend, cheering for the Army. The hunter of Gen. Hunter was that the Army must have proved itself in a wonderful manner to 15,000 soldiers.

What caused the Rhyll riots? Who was to blame?

No One to Blame.

Commissioner Howard's answer to this was "Nobody was to blame. It was just a case of conditions. The men

sentenced to death by the Turkish Government, but succeeded in evading the law by fleeing to Tiberias. A 30 mile race was offered for his head, but being unable to find him, the Turks decided to reward the sufferer himself. Fortunately I learned of their designs, and one night I escaped to Damascus. There I worked on the highways and earned enough for bread and water. I was there until the Holy Land was finally freed from the yoke of the oppressor by England's mighty arm. Then I returned to Jerusalem.

Why should I have fled? Horror met me when I returned to Jerusalem. My father, who had two sons, Aaron and Joshua, had died; they died of starvation. And soon I got word that my son Pinke, too, had perished of hunger in Tiberias. My friend, I am old and broken.

This has been too much. Now three widows and six orphans are left to my care by my sons, and I can scarcely support myself. There is nothing left in my house that I can sell. It is empty, save for a few mat and pillows. Can you imagine my tortures when I see my daughters-in-law and their children? They are hungry and ill-clad.

My dear friend, in my despair I have decided to turn to you for help. I am so pained, yes, but I must. I cannot write you any more, my heart is too full of sorrow. Your sincere friend, SOLOMON ALIACH.

Many other Hebrews are in the same plight as the author of the above letter, and money is needed to provide food to alleviate their sufferings. The relief fund has been opened in this city on April 1, and continues all the following day.

MANUFACTURERS AGREE TO BIG CUT IN PRICES

Pittsburg, Pa., March 28.—Representatives of 38 per cent of the nut, bolt and rivet manufacturers of the United States and Canada agreed upon a cut of from 20 to 40 per cent in war prices of products made by their companies at a meeting here yesterday.

"This is in line with the action of the steel industry," said Charles J. Graham of Pittsburg, who presided. "I believe that the action will be a great stimulus to the business of the entire country and Canada."

NOTES OF INTEREST FROM CITY HALL

Assessment Commissioner Stephen Grant has made a recommendation to the city council that the temporary assessments be paid the \$100 a month for which they have asked, and that the clerks receive \$20 a week. The assessments are \$85 a month and the clerks are being paid \$18 a week. "The other employees of the department also are recommended for increases in salary. It is probable that the increases will be granted. This will be considered on Thursday evening by No. 1 committee prior to the meeting of the council."

CZECHS DENY BERLIN YARN.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—The Czechoslovak mission here received today an official denial of the report that President Masaryk's resignation, which was sent from Berlin by way of Copenhagen early this week.
