



# PROSECUTOR IS TO **CALL WITNESSES TO** PROVE CONFESSION

Anson Best Soon To Be On Trial On Murder Charge.

Pontiac, May 4.—How the state expects to prove its case against Anson Best, charged with the murder of Vera Schneider, 19-year-old telephone operator, April 24, was outlined in circuit court here this morning by Prosecutor Glenn C. Gillespie.

The prosecutor described events leading up to Best's arrest, and added:

"He confessed to the crime, and then denied the confession, claiming it was forced from him."

Witnesses would be produced, Mr. Gillespie said, who, contrary to Best's last statement, that he had never seen Miss Schneider, would testify that he was with her'the night she was killed. Among them, he said, would be the proprietors of a restaurant who would identify Best as the man who accompanied her to their ice cream parlor. Newspapermen, he said, would tell of finding a handkerchief on the banks of the Clinton River, where Best, in his first statement, said he threw Miss Schneider's handkerchief after using it to wipe blood from his hands.
