There is but little stirring in the local markets, and while there have been so far no changes in prices, this is, perhaps, due to the fact that there is so little business being done. In some lines of machine tools deliveries are better, but in most conditions are the same as for some time past. There has been a slight reduction in the production of pig iron and in finished steel in the United States mills. A number of mills are keeping their product in a semi-finished state, and finishing just enough to keep the cars available filled. Transportation facilities are said to be improving lately.

It is pointed out that the two midsummer months are always dull, and that the first two weeks of August are the dullest of a slack period. The settlement of the railroad rate case will result in a better outlook for the steel trade, not necessarily for the amount of business to be got from the roads, but because the roads will be put into better physical condition. They will thus be able to keep the wheels of industry in general going more smoothly, which will in turn react to the benefit of the steel industry.

In connection with this increase in the rates on United States roads, it is felt that it will be very soon followed by increases on Canadian roads. Then, again, a betterment of transportation facilities will help the production of plate, and this in turn will mean more cars being built. Some authorities think that it will be fairly late next year before the car situation is normal.
