COUNCIL TO VOTE ON SANITARY SEWER SYSTEMS

Matter Will Come Before Civic Fathers

Monday Night.

By a two-thirds vote the city council likely will decide Monday to build two more additions to the sanitary sewer system at a total cost of \$46.619. The larger of these will be known as the Oak and Elm streets system.

It will drain Trafalgar street, from Egerton to Hyla street; Hyla street, and Elm, Sycamore and Oak streets. Its probable cost is \$34.107 of which \$30,132 will be charged against the property benefitted and the remainder, \$3,974, against the city for flankages and wings. The assessable frontage is 8,637 feet, while the intersections and flankages make up 1,659 feet.

The smaller system will be named the Pine street sewer. It will drain Oak street, from Pine street to a point 600 feet south; Elm street, from Eigerton street to Elm. Its probable cost is \$12,512, of which \$11,247 will be charged against the property and \$1,264 against the city. The assessable frontage is 3,653 feet, and the intersections and flankages total 515 feet.

For the Wellington and High Street Section of City At Monday Night's Meeting.

Departing from the usual practice, the city council will consider a combined sanitary and storm sewer system for the Wellington and High street section of the city. It may also erect a public comfort station at the intersection

those two streets.

The engineering department in recommending this course to the council states that the paving on streets without sewers cannot be gone on with until both storm and sanitary sewers have been laid. In order to hasten the work, they advise the combined system.

The system will take care of the Wellington road, High street, and the unsewered sections of Clarence, Hill, South, Waterloo and Nelson streets, which are too low to drain into the existing interceptor on Hill street. Provision has also been made to intercept the sanitary flow from the sewers on Wellington and South streets at present emptying directly into the Thames. weinington and South streets at present emptying directly into the Thames. The estimated cost of the work is \$271,377, including necessary river cross-ings, pumping station and equipment, force main and private drain connections. It includes 4.45 miles of com-bined storm and sanitary sewers eight inches to thirty-nine inches in diameter, 4.04 miles of six-inch private drain con-nections and 100 manholes.
