BYLAW FOR TRUNK SEWER

Will Be Submitted to Ratepayers on June 27.

Bylaws to provide for an outlay of more than six millions of dollars are to be submitted to the ratepayers on June 27.

The local board of health yesterday afternoon decided to recommend that a bylaw for a trunk sewer and filtration plant be submitted on that date, when bylaws asking \$700,000 for the seawall, \$250,000 for Wilton-avenue viaduct, and \$150,000 for grants to St. Michael's, Grace and Western Hospitals are to be entrusted to the tender mercies of the electorate.

On the basis of the city engineer's estimate the amount which must be expended on water purification measures will be about \$3,200,000.

There is also a possibility that a bylaw for the new eastern entrance to the exhibition may be submitted, but the probability that it will be held back on the ground that the success of all the bylaws would be further impeded by adding to the total of the amount to be raised.

At the board of health meeting John Shaw opposed the filtration plant, deeming it to be unnecessary. Ald. Foster was hostile to submitting so many bylaws in one year, predicting that all would go down to defeat.

It was decided that Ald. Chubb, chairman, should accompany Controller Harrison, Dr. Sheard and Waterworks Engineer Follows in a trip to New York and other United States cities to gather information respecting water filtration and sewage disposal. The party left last night.

Ald. J. J. Graham pointed out that meat designed for local consumption was not inspected and suggested that a special meat inspector be appointed. Guelph has such an inspector, and Dr. Sheard was asked to communicate with him as to the results of inspection.

The board of control yesterday waited upon the provincial secretary and were practically given assurance that the isolation hospital will obtain a government grant on the per capita basis. The hospital receives at present no grant whatever from the government. Last year it cost the city \$20,771. There are 170 beds and on the per capita basis the annual grant will be about \$3500.

CATARACT TAKES OFFER MON'N'T BE ACCEPTED

Monopoly Has Its Disadvantages For the Consumer Grocers' Guild Proceedings.

HAMILTON, May 6.—(Special.)—The Cataract Power Company, at an informal conference this evening, offered to supply power for civic plants at ten per cent. less than the hydro-electric power commission, or at \$16 a horse power which they guarantee to be ten per cent. lower than the commission's price for power in Hamilton. It also offered to sell the street lighting plant, exclusive of poles, at for \$50,000 cash with a yearly rental of \$250 per each lamp, for the use of the poles. The company also agreed to stand by its offer to supply the new waterworks pumps. No decision was reached by the aldermen. These friendly to the company regard it as a solar plexus for the commission, but the hydro aldermen say it would pay the company to supply the street lighting for the civic plants if they could shut out competition by so doing. They also pointed out that the company wants an underground system of street lighting and that the company's plant would not meet the needs of the city.

The Britannia Park Co. has decided to erect stands with an accommodation for 1500 on the west side of the park and the lacrosse games will be played there.

Brigadier Cotton visited the local garrison this evening and made an informal inspection of the 81st regiment. He was entertained at a banquet by the officers.

Grocers' Officers. The wholesale grocers' guild this afternoon elected the following officers: W. G. Craig, Kingston, president; Fred H. Hamilton, Hamilton, vice-president; committee on costs, William Logan, Toronto; Sam Vila, Hamilton; John H. Hamilton, Hamilton; committee on bylaws, J. H. Simpson, Guelph and E. M. Trovren, Toronto, addressed the guild this afternoon and a resolution was passed calling upon the members to exert all their influence against the co-operation bill now before the senate.

The board of works this evening decided to appeal to the Ontario railway board against the alleged nuisance caused by the diamond of the street railway at the corner of Harkness and Hess-streets. The expenses of the street lighting arbitration amounted to \$1024.

Edward Taylor was arrested this evening on the charge of stealing tools from the street railway.

An Actress' Death. Mrs. F. R. Partridge, Chicago, daughter of Thomas Lewis, 312 South Bay-street, died this morning after an illness of four days. As a child she won an enviable name for herself on the stage. She was to have joined the Top of the World Company last season, in one of the principal roles, but was prevented from doing so by illness. The funeral will be held Friday afternoon at 2.30.

The Liberals of the city have invited A. G. MacKay to address a meeting here during the campaign. The strike of the cotton and wool operatives in Montreal will not affect the employees of the local concerns, who have accepted a reduction in wages.

At the meeting of the financial committee Thursday the complaint that the natural gas company is making a minimum monthly charge of \$1 will be investigated.

Harry J. Allen, the organizer of Knox hospital, died this morning at his residence, 190 St. George-st., after a long illness. He was married this afternoon at the Methodist Church, Waterdown.

The temperance people are negotiating for the purchase of Charles Silbert's hotel building.

Grocers' Guild. At the meeting of the Ontario Wholesale Grocers' Guild this morning, H. C. Beckett read a paper on "The Importance of the Trade Association and Their Relations with the Government." He complained that both the provincial and federal governments looked upon these trade associations with suspicion and were antagonistic. An irresponsible press was the cause of this. The governments also paid too much attention to the labor unions. It might be necessary for the trade to use their voices to impress a lesson on the government.

Michael Cook, a Niagara Falls plasterer, was arrested this morning for stealing a ride on a blind beggar's G.T.R. train. His story was that his wife and family of seven children were starving and he had set out for Toronto to get work, having no money to pay his fare. He was sent down for 21 days, but will be released if his story is proved to be true.

An application for the annexation of part of Barton Township to Hamilton was considered by the Ontario Railway Board at Toronto to-day. The hearing was adjourned sine die to allow the city to pass a resolution requesting the measure, the chairman, holding this to be indispensable. City Solicitor Waddell showed that in the proclamation by which a portion of the township had been annexed in 1903, clause 6 provided that no further application should be made for that year. This only governs one of the parties, however.

A Brandon, Man., despatch says that James Armstrong, western traveler for the Dominion Drug Company of Hamilton, was found dead in bed at the Grand View Hotel about noon to-day. He was about 44 years of age and unmarried.

THAT NEW ELECTION BILL AN "ENGINE OF TYRANNY"

So Boyce, M. P., Describes It—Comtee Says New Ontario Can't Vote June 8.

OTTAWA, May 5.—The Aylesworth election bill occupied the afternoon in the commons, Duncan Bole (Empire) resuming the debate. He said that Mr. Borden had called for the names of persons left off the Manitoba voters' list he would supply the information. He then proceeded to read a couple of affidavits made by Galicians alleging that 400 names were put on the Manitoba lists in one constituency by fraud, perjury and impersonation. Mr. Borden remarked that the proceedings complained of were under the nationalization act enacted by this parliament. Mr. Boyce (Algoma) answered the affidavit scandal, pointing out that although the election referred to was held over a year ago and a session of the Manitoba legislature had been held in the interval, not a word had been heard before the alleged fraud, either in the legislature or in the commons. The Aylesworth bill would promote corruption and ballot thefting and he dealt at length with the details of the act in the unorganized portion of Ontario, where the system was in force last election. Hundreds of bogus lists in Algoma, and the government candidate made every effort to prevent appeal proceedings.

Mr. Boyce described the Aylesworth bill as an "engine of tyranny and oppression," and in accepting it the commons would be sacrificing the loftiest ideals and principles for the retention of power.

Mr. Borden argued that the condition of affairs warranted such a bill, and diverted to a discussion of the impending elections in Ontario. It would be physically impossible for enumerators in northern Ontario to complete their lists and give opportunity for appeal before the election. Mr. Whitney to the contrary notwithstanding, to hold all the elections at the same time, he would have the floor again to-morrow.

R. L. Borden asked if the resignation of Col. Gourlay, purveyor of marine, had been accepted, and the minister replied that he had asked for leave of absence and superannuation. The leave had been granted, and the latter was still under consideration.

Mr. Lavergne (Montreal) was told by the prime minister that the government did not intend to proclaim any legal holidays during the celebration of the Quebec tercentenary. The use of French and English on the ten-cent postage stamps to be issued for tercentenary is still under consideration.

Mr. Lavergne was informed that it would be time to consider the appointment of Hon. Adair Turgeon to the next vacancy in the Queen's Bench, such vacancy arising. His question as to whether Turgeon had been accused of graft in the administration of the department of crown lands in Quebec was out of order.
