FIRE ESCAPES LACKING JURY'S VERDICT SAYS

Iron Ladder Only Means of Emergency Exit From Foundry, and - Employes Didn't Know of It.

HAMILTON, Feb. 23 .- (Special.) --The jury that enquired into the Gurney-Tilden fire, which took place last Thursday evening, and in which Henry Bawden and A. P. McCully, two of the employes, lost their lives, brought in a verdict to-night to the effect that the two men came to their deaths thru suffocation; that sufficient means of escape had not been provided by the company, and that the lacquer room and other places where inflammable material was kept should be isolated or made fireproof. Many witnesses were called, including two government factory inspectors, Arthur W. Holmes and Robert Hungerford, Toronto, and Chief Teneyck, and Assistant Chief James of the fire department. The inspectors said there was but one fire escape in the building; that it was in the rear, and that it was only an iron ladder and not a fire escape, such as called for by the new government re-

Percy Woodbridge, one of those who jumped from a window, said that when he was making his way to the window he stumbled across the body of a man, which he thought must have been that of Bawden. He carried the body to a bench, but was forced to leave it there. He was in bad shape

Some of the encloyes testified that they did not know that there was a fire escape in the building. John Gil-hert, who had worked for the company 11 years, said he did not know that there was one.

BANK CLOSES ITS DOORS WARRANT FOR BOOKKEEPER

Cambridge, Mass., Institution Has Been Looted of \$144,000 -Steckholders Liable.

BOSTON, Mass. Feb. 23.-Following the discovery that the National City Bank of Cambridge had been looted of \$144,000, the doors of the institution were closed to-day, probably forever, by the comptroller of currency. Six hours later a warrant was issued

for George W. Coleman, the bookkeeper of the bank, who was last heard from in Kansas City. Coleman is charged with embezzling the funds. The institution is insolvent, the capital stock of \$100,000 and the surplus having been wiped out by the defalca-

\$127,432, mostly money of small trades-men. Among the stockholders is Chas. W. Elliott, president emeritus of Maryland College. Under the national banking laws the stockholders are liable to assessment if the assets are not sufficient to pay the creditors in full. THIRTEEN NEW CHAPTERS

Fifty-Second Annual Convocation of Society Held in Toronto.

Abundant growth and an enlarged measure of prosperity, according to the reports of the several committees, mark the condition of the Grand Chapter of the Royal Arch Masons, which held its fifty-second annual convocation at the Temple building yesterday. The convention was presided over by M. E. Comp. George Moore of Hamilton, grand first principal.

Some of the outstanding features evidencing the growth of the chapter were the increase of membership from 13,032 to 14,103 in the past year, and Lent. the institution of 13 new chapters. The benevolent account also grew, Grand Chapter allocating \$980 and the subordinate chapters expending \$1937 for benevolent purposes. The assets represent a value of \$32,783, to which is added a further investment of \$2000 a year. The revenue for the year was \$13,132 and the disbursements - \$7014, leaving a cash balance of \$6117.

Grand Z.'s Address.

In his address the Grand Z. George Moore, referred to the pleasant relations existing between Canada and the other jurisdictions of the world.

He noted some decisions during the year, one of which was that a master mason, who, thru physical disability created at a date subsequent to his taking the M. M. degree, was unable, to meet the requirements of the ceremonies in the proper manner was therefore, ineligible for advancement. He also ruled that in examplifying the degrees the introduction of additional material and paraphernalia to give spectacular and dramatic effect to the ceremonies, was a direct violation of the constitution and that the author-
