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AMERICANS SUBJECT TO LAW

Not Exempt From Colonial Statute for Preservation of Fisheries, LONDON, July 19 .- At The Hague Mr. Ewart, continuing, argued that the treaty of 1818 accorded fishing rights solely to the inhabitants and to American fishermen, not to American vessels, so the Newfoundland law of 1906, prohibiting the inhabitants of the isprohibiting the inhabitants of the island from taking service on foreign ships had not constituted an infringement of the treaty.
