RURAL LEADERSHIP **CONVENTION CONTINUES** 

Many Very Interesting Addresses of Great Value Heard at Guelph.

Special to The Teronto World.

Guelph, July 26.—In discussing the organization of church work in rural communities, Rev. W. C. Conway, of Auburn, declared before the convention on rural leadership today that the religious motive underlying life is the key to rural upbuilding. It was not so much a question of trying to save souls as to save lives, and to accomplish this much, co-ordinated work is required. The country church, he said, needs a new program, which shall be simple and intensive.

The importance of the teacher in a rural uplift was emphasized by Mr. Foght. What is required is one who will stay on the job for life and interest himself in all phases of rural life.

Mr. MacLaren, in discussing rural sociology, affirmed that individuality must be prominently brought out. It is not more people that are wanted, but better quality, and effecient leaders here find a task that develops every effort.

An important address was that of Prof. Zavitz, emphasizing the importance of a study of seed and the improvement of the different varieties. He brought this home by showing the success that has followed experiments in barley and oats, noted increases in the production of which have been secured.

F. C. Hart declared that in order to establish more confidence in the market system, it is necessary that the farmers should get into the trade and remedy some of the existing conditions. No matter what system we have some one must act as intermediary.
