WILLAM HANLON'S MEMOIRS.

William Hanlon, one of the famous Hanlons, whose new production of "Fantasma," will be the offering at the Grand this week, is at work now at his memoirs and interesting they cer-tainly will be when revealed in print. Not only has Mr. Hanlon traveled all over the world and back again, but he has played before almost every civilized people on the globe. He relates one of his experiences with Admiral Sir William Parker of the British Navy. "Besides playing at the opera house," he writes, "we were invited when in Malta to give our performances on board of two of the three-decker battleships in the harbor, the Queen, of 110 guns, and the Caledonia, 120 guns. The ships were elaborately decorated for the oceasion and the finest people from the city were invited. "On the Queen the farce of Box and Cox was given. On the Caledonia we saw the sailor's hornpipe danced with more skill than I have seen since. The admiral of the fleet, Sir William Park-er, must have taken a fancy to me, for he told Mr. Lees, who accompanied us, that if he would leave me with him, he would make a fine sailor of me. The sailors enjoyed fighting those days. We heard voices in the square above one o'clock one morning and it appeared that by previous arrangement forty sailors and forty mariners of the flaet had planned a fistic carnival on shore. They were arranged in two rows of twenty couples, a soldier facing the marine. The word was given and a rcyal battle ensued."
