CHILD'S PLAY FIRE DRILL ENDS IN DEATH Little Mary Mitchell Used Matches to Make Fun Seem More Real.

Boston, March 23—Practising a fire drill at her home as taught in one of the public schools of Malden, a touch of realism she devised resulted in the death of 3-year old Mary Elizabeth Mitchell, daughter of James Mitchell, of that city, yesterday, from burns received while playing with matches. Little Mary is a pupil in the West grammar school. She heard people talk of the recent Cleveland schoolhouse calamity, and her mind was kept constantly on the subject by drills at the schoolhouse and by children playing fire department.

REPORTERS' STRIKE IN REICHSTAG ENDED Offending Leader Apologizes for Insulting Remark, and Harmony is Restored.

Berlin, March 24—The strike of the Reichstag journalists, which began on Thursday last, was settled this evening. Under pressure of the various party leaders, Herr Groeber, the centre leader, who had called the journalists "swine" because they bore a statement used by a member to the effect that negroes also had immortal souls, read a statement at the end of today's sitting, expressing apologies for the language he had used in referring to the journalists. At the conclusion of the statement, a meeting of the journalists was called, and they voted to return to work on Thursday.

CHRISTIAN EDIFICES DISCOVERED IN EGYPT Philadelphia, March 23—News received from Dr. David Randall MacIver's archaeological expedition to Egypt has greatly interested scientific circles at the University of Pennsylvania. While in the north of Egypt, early in February, Dr. MacIver discovered several Christian churches of a date within two or three centuries after the death of Christ. These were carefully cleared of the heaps of desert sand which have covered them during the lapse of centuries. The members of the expedition then made a map and photographs of the shrines. It is thought at the university that when these maps and pictures are published they will be added to the small amount of knowledge antiquarians possess regarding the churches and the modes of worship of the earliest Christians outside of the city of Rome.

As a rival to the famous Cleopatra vase discovered at Anibeh, which is now carefully boxed up in Cairo, awaiting shipment to the university museum, Dr. MacIver discovered, in a little known locality near the second cataract of the Nile, a number of marvellously carved capitals of columns and a cornice sculptured with the heads of the Royal Draus. This snake was the emblem of the ancient Egyptian monarchy. The columns and the cornice are similar to the sculptures of Philae, and are of the same period. Dr. MacIver believes that these newly discovered pieces of architecture represent the finest works of their class in existence, and for beauty of design and execution he says they rival the work on some of the most famous of the Grecian temples.

FINE CARLETON COUNTY RESIDENCE BURNED Hartland, N. B., March 24.—The beautiful residence of John V. Kearney was entirely destroyed by fire last evening entailing a loss of about \$7,000. There was some insurance and nearly all the contents were saved. The blaze originated by the explosion of a lantern in the stable.

Bristol Notes. Bristol, N. B., March 23—The funeral of Ada Kinney took place this afternoon at the Primitive Baptist church, services being conducted by Rev. D. E. Brooks. The deceased was 26 years of age, and is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robinson Kinney, and two brothers, Thomas Ebbett has bought the James Jones property at Bath, and moved there.
