

NOTED BOSTON SWINDLER GETS LENGTHY SENTENCE C. F. King Convicted of 27 Counts of Larceny Must Serve Not Less Than Ten Years at Hard Labor

Boston, Jan. 13.—Cardenio Flavius King, former financial agent and broker, occupying palatial offices in Boston and New York and for a short time, publisher of a daily paper in Boston, was tonight sentenced by Judge Schofield in the superior criminal court to serve a term of not less than ten and not more than fourteen years at hard labor in the state prison at Charlestown, having been convicted in twenty-one counts on charges of larceny, embezzlement and securing on false pretenses the sum of \$22,000 from his customers.
