INTERESTING REPORT OF TEACHER TRAINING DEPT.

E. R. Machum Tells the New Brunswick Sunday School Convention of the Work Done During the Year.

At last evening's session of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Sunday School Convention at Fredericton the following report on the teachers' training department was submitted by E. R. Machum: 1. T—Delivered Tuesday night. Head come The Teacher Training Department of the New Brunswick Sunday School Association was organized in 1896, and the first class was graduated the following year at the convention held in Centenary church, St. John, the diplomas being presented by Dr. H. M. Hamill. Both an elementary and an advanced course of study were formulated, the diplomas being issued by our own association, the international association while recognizing the work having no direct supervision or setting up any standard. Some four hundred pupils received the diplomas of the New Brunswick association.




