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## COUNTRY MARKET

### Tomorrow's Supply Expected to be Fully Up to the Average—Lamb and Poultry Scarce.

Tomorrow's supply at the country market will be fully up to the average. Best is plentiful and of good quality, steaks and roasts ranging from 10 to 20 cents. Lamb is scarce, and prices are quoted at from 10 to 14 cents. Veal is not very plentiful, the prevailing figures being from 8 to 12 cents. Poultry are scarce; chickens bring from 50 cents to \$1.20 a pair; fowl 80 cents, \$1.00 and \$1.10; and ducks \$1.00 to \$1.25 per pair. There is a good supply of native vegetables, prices on which are being quoted as follows: Beans, peas and potatoes, 30 cents per peck; cauliflower, 5 to 25 cents; and cabbage, 5 to 8 cents per head. Tomatoes are worth 4 cents per pound, and squash 4 cents. Corn ranges from 20 to 30 cents per dozen. Carrots and beets 3 to 4 cents, and celery 8 to 10 cents a bunch. Cucumbers sell at 3 cents a box. Raspberries are quoted at 8 to 10, and blueberries 5 to 7 cents a box. Old cheese sells at 14, and new from 12 to 14 cents a pound.
