THE MARKETS AT A GLANCE

(Hardware and Metal, Feb. 24.)
The freight situation has not im-
proved during the week, as the number of
points on which cargoes prevail have
been added to the open market. The
freight situation in small centres that
the railway officials appear indifferent
to do not seem to be exerting their
services to better conditions. Freight
shipments have begun to accumulate in
wholesaler's warehouses.

There has been a number of price
changes during the week, all of which
are in an upward direction. Wire nails
have reached the \$5 base price in cer-
tain sections. Lead shot and lead pro-
ducts are all higher in price, owing to
the situation in pig lead market. Paris
green prices have been announced, which
are higher than the open market price.
New prices on next season's
season's shales, hocky sticks, slights and
kindred lines are advanced up to 10
per cent. Other lines that have advanced
during the week include soldering cop-
per, cabinet locks, glue, glaziers' panes,
plumbers' and painters' torches, alumi-
num ware.

There is a firmness in the
market for all Canadian makes of build-
ing hardware, owing to the recent ad-
vance that has been put into effect by
American manufacturers. Axes and
cross-cut saws are also in firm market.
In spite of the handicaps to business
there has been a good trade during the
week.

GROCERY MARKET

The following comment on the market
situation as regards foodstuffs appeared
in Canadian Grocer last week:

Sugar is holding in an uncertain mar-
ket at the advance recorded last week.
From all accounts the revolution is still
in progress on the Island of Cuba and
some of the centrals have had to close
through shortage of labor. Even a
temporary cessation of work among the
grinding season is on would greatly cur-
tail production. Flour held steady dur-
ing the week, but mill-feeds advanced.
Mills are able to get their shipments
through from the west better now. The
railroads have lifted the embargo par-
tially and are now permitting them to
ship in the proportion of one hundred
pounds of four to thirty pounds of
reds.

Tea held steady in a firm market and
there is strong probability there will be
higher prices than those now prevailing.
Of the dried fruits, prunes are in strong
market and advances are anticipated in
this commodity in the near future. Cooked
meats are all in firm market, with a
good demand reported. Compound lard
regained its position of
strength after a temporary weakness
noted last week. Live hogs were easier
during the week. Butter is in firmer
tone and new-laid eggs are not coming
in sufficient supply to meet the demand.
Live chickens and hens are in good de-
mand. There have been advances in nu-
merous lines during the week, among
them might be named condensed and
evaporated milk, table and bulk salt,
molasses in tin, soap chips, soap, lard,
bricks, lantern glass, lamp chimneys,
sulphur, sardines, soda biscuits. There
have been further advances in potatoes
and onions. Halibut is in firm market
with higher prices quoted. Business has
continued exceptionally good.

BOSTON REPORT ON
LUMBER MARKET

Boston, Feb. 27.—This has been a week
of interesting developments in the spruce
lumber trade. The base price for dimen-
sions has been advanced \$3 and in ran-
ges there have been important changes,
all of course in an upward direction.
Careful observers were not greatly sur-
prised by the change, but there were
more than a few people to whom it
came as a mild shock. There are al-
ways buyers in all lines of business who
are inclined to think on first learning of
an addition to a price that they are be-
ing imposed upon and no doubt some
of the lumber retailers are commenting
on unfavorable on the new quotations as
are householders on the advance of sugar.

Every fair minded man, however, must
admit that the manufacturers have much
to say that seems to justify their course.
It is easier certainly to pool-pool some
of their arguments than it is to answer
them. No one will affirm that they are
wrong in saying that the production at
present is very restricted. Their con-
dition for the reason the demand is
unusually active appears to be borne
out by the fact that building permits
for Greater Boston from the first to the
14th of February are more than they
have been in years.

That the Canadian government rail-
ways are so engaged in shipping lumber
and munitions to Halifax and St. John
that they will not allow their cars to be
loaded for this country is a matter of
common knowledge. There is also
ground for believing that the output in
the State of Maine will be reduced this
year by one-third and that in New
Hampshire by two-fifths. Quebec ship-
pers believe that their production will
not be more than half what it is in nor-
mal years. Moreover, it seems probable
that some lumber manufacturers may be
induced to part with their logs to the
pulp people who are offering for them
unheard of prices. All these strong
points are certainly very well worthy of
attention.
