GERMAN FREIGHTER RESCUED FROM SAND

After Ten Years on Guatemalan Coast She is Floated by Salvage Company

For Service of the Allies—Cost \$1,000,000, Sold for \$55,000, and Sent to Sea Against Expense of \$250,000

Another chapter in the remarkable history of the steel freighter Sesostri, formerly one of the largest units of the German mercantile fleet, for ten years stranded in the sands of the Guatemalan coast, and now rescued and about to be put back into service by the British Columbia Salvage Company, has begun with the temporary American registration of the vessel under the new name of the "Francis L. Skinner". She is now on her way north to the home of her new owners in Victoria, B. C., and is soon to add one to the list of new freighters needed in the service of the Allies.

SEMI-READY SALE STARTS TOMORROW

"PRICE IN THE POCKET" LABEL COMPELS STRAIGHT BAR-GAINS

Company Claims to Have Fought the Higher Cost of Living by Selling Clothes Without Any Profit Since the War Year.

"We are not going to wait until the dull days of July for our sale," said the manager of the Semi-ready store. "Our summer sale starts right away, three days before Dominion day, our special discounts will be given on every garment in the store, with extra special prices on summer suits which we do not intend to carry over at any cost."

"These garments will all be sold at prices cheaper than before the war. The price label in the pocket means much to the buyer. It is the standard of real value, and cannot be changed like one could change pen or pencil marks. Then when one sells at a reduction of 85 or more on a Semi-ready suit, there is the certainty that there is an actual saving, and not an imaginary marked-up price."

"The manufacturer of price-marked goods has a standard to live up to. Ascending costs of material and labor force him to economy and efficiency methods which the open price man does not have to meet."

"Since the war British wool has advanced over 200 per cent., yet the ready Company have been holding prices down so close that they have operated without profit."

"We feel that we have done our share in fighting the higher cost of living. At our summer sale, which will last for a fortnight, starting from Thursday morning, we will have some 'Loneley' bargains as low as \$10, and all suits will be offered subject to at least 20 per cent. discount."

Molasses Schooner Gone. There is nothing left of the four-masted schooner Edgar E. Murdoch, which was wrecked on the Orford Proprietor Ledges off Grand Manan, but a few broken timbers. The vessel, after going ashore, was carried off again and picked up by the tugboat "Loneley" and towed to a point off Ingalls' Island and hopes were held out that the hull and at least part of the cargo might be saved. A message from Grand Manan last night proved these hopes groundless. The vessel was on its way from Barbados to St. John, loaded with molasses consigned to J. T. Knight & Company. The vessel was valued at \$100,000 and the cargo at \$200,000.

BY AUTHORITY PROCLAMATION JOSIAH WOOD. His Honor the Lieutenant Governor directs the publication of the following for general information: Whereas, the 1st of July is the semi-centennial of the confederation of the Canadian provinces; And, whereas, a joint committee of Senate and House of Commons was appointed to consider and report on the proper celebration of the occasion; And, whereas, the said committee have recommended that, "As the day falls on Sunday, it seems to be particularly fitting that the churches and the Sabbath schools of all denominations should incorporate into their exercises the recognition of the facts and lessons embodied in our national birth and fifty years of progress, and have requested that all religious and Sabbath schools superintendents give to the celebration their hearty and intelligent co-operation"; And, whereas, Monday the 2nd day of July, has been fixed by proclamation for the celebration of Dominion Day, and the committee have recommended that the celebration on that day be as elaborate as possible, without expense and elaborate display, as befits war time, and carried out on the broadest social and democratic lines, a plain sincere people's celebration, a tribute to the founders of our Dominion and the institutions and ideals of our common country"; And, whereas, the most earnestly request that the cities and municipalities of the province, clubs and patriotic associations, co-operate with the citizens generally in commemorating the day and the occasion, along the lines suggested in the report.

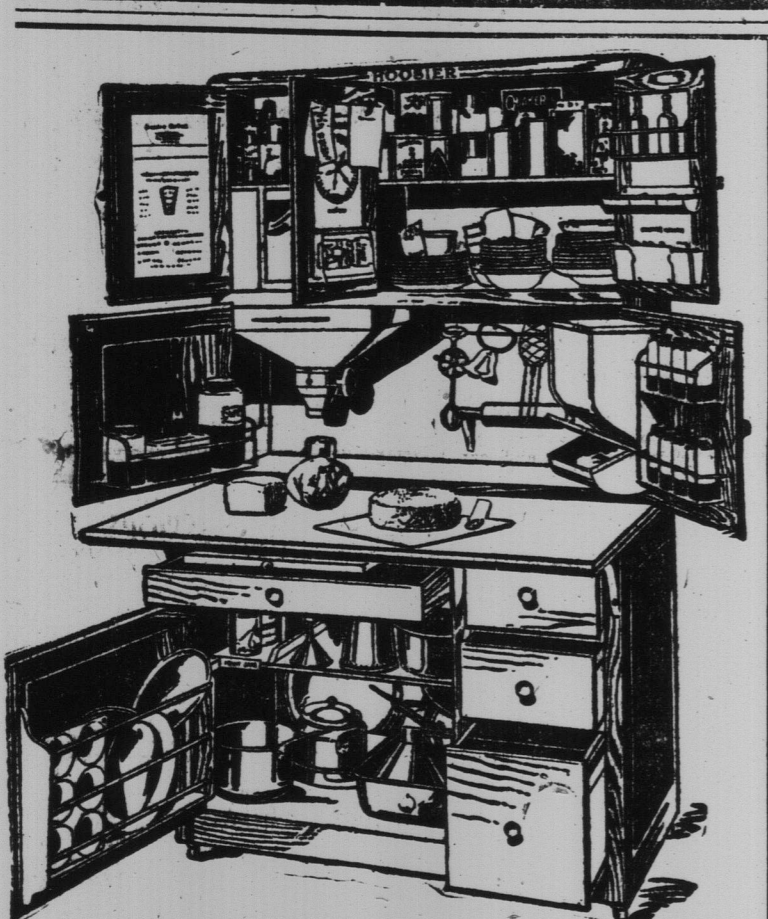
